PIERCE REDUCES SENTENCE OF MUCH PROVOKED CONVICT

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 18.—Governor Pierce today commuted from four years to two years and nine months the state prison sentence of Roy Atkins, who was convicted at Marshfield of assault with intent to kill. He has served the latter time and will be released.

According to representations to the governor, marriage to a woman 10 years his senior caused Atkins trouble. He is said to have lived an exemplary life, giving much of his time to caring for his aged parents, until he met the woman at a boarding house. She is said to have induced him to marry her. About the same time the woman's ex-husband appeared, and she told the new groom that she had to have \$1,000, and that he must get it for her. He didn't have it and refused to ask his parents to mortgage their property to raise it. He also refused to raise \$500 when she reduced her demand. She sued for divorce about a week after the marriage. Meeting him on the street, the woman one day, so the story goes, had him go to her room where she renewed her demands.
