AT THE ANDERSON MEETINGS

Evangelist Scores Card-playing in Home or Club, Dancing and Movies—Declares Young People Need Better Home Training to Make Christian Citizens.

"Be not deceived; God is not mocked; for whatsoever a man soweth that shall he also reap. For he that soweth to his flesh shall of the flesh reap corruption; but he that soweth to the spirit shall of the spirit reap life everlasting."—Galatians 6:7, 8.

"America leads the world in immorality, in gambling and in immorality," said Evangelist Harry O. Anderson at the armory last night. Preaching from the text quoted above, he put over a challenging sermon on present-day conditions in our country. The discourse was full of fire and illustrated by means of striking figures and anecdotes, and yet it was a careful and free from sensationalism or claptrap. The crowd was large and the interest manifest.

"Many a sermon has been preached on the text 'Sow to the flesh, and of the flesh you will reap corruption.' I would, by inclination, choose the latter half of the text, 'Sow to the spirit, and of the spirit you will reap life everlasting.' But I would not be a true minister of the gospel if I just took half the message. So tonight I take the unenviable part of the text. It is just as necessary to warn people before they go into sin as it is to reach people who are already ensnared by the devil. It is of far more importance to warn people before they sow their wild oats. God says if you sow to the flesh, you will of the flesh reap corruption. It is a truth evident to every thinking man. When you sow what you expect wheat, and when you sow oats you expect to reap oats. As it is in the physical realm, so it is in the spiritual realm. No matter who you may be, you can't beat God's game. If you are out there sowing to the flesh, in the devil's society, of the flesh you will reap corruption. Jesus said, 'You can't serve two masters. You can't serve God and Mammon. Jesus is no compromiser. You may compromise with the world, and think you get by with it. You may think you can run with the worldly crowd, in a worldly way, and still reap life everlasting. But you can't. You not only sow the kind of seed you expect to reap, you not only reap the same kind, but you reap a multiplied harvest. You sow to the wind and you reap the whirlwind.'"

Touching the subject of the 18th Amendment, the speaker emphasized the fact that the man who purchases intoxicating liquor is just as guilty as the seller. "I don't care what crime he moves in, or what his standing may be, no man has a right to carry a flask in his hip pocket. In my home town there was a preacher invited to address one of the great services, as they gathered for their Sunday lunch, and a fellow got up and said, 'I have just been down in the basement of a hotel and had a swig of the forbidden cup.' He boasted of the fact that he had broken the 18th Amendment, before those representative business men, and everybody cheered except the preacher. That preacher had a backbone like the spoke of a cartwheel, and he stood up and looked those business men in the face, and he said, 'I have traveled over this country far and wide and have addressed service clubs, but I am ashamed to stand here and hear your chairman boast of the fact that he has violated the 18th amendment, a part of our constitution, and I am ashamed that you have applauded. What is real Americanism? What is a real patriot? Joining the Fourth of July parade is not patriotism. A patriot is a man who says all law is sacred, and when the majority passes a law, the patriot obeys the majority rule. As between the man who sells and the man who drinks, I think the man who drinks is the guiltiest of all.'"

"A great wave of sensualism is sweeping over this country. In the average dance hall, the fellows are so stale if you don't have a little booze in your hip pocket. But you sow to the flesh," says God, "and of the flesh you will

reap corruption." America not only leads the world in immorality, but America is a gambling nation. That idea of getting something for nothing, of getting rich quick, of gambling in stocks, with markets, with farms, with the labor of boys and girls, any way to get the almighty dollar! We need a great movement in this country of everybody getting back to the soil and trying to produce something, instead of trying to live off somebody else."

The evangelist condemned card-playing in the home as the means of leading to card-playing in the nation. That idea of getting something for nothing, of getting rich quick, of gambling in stocks, with markets, with farms, with the labor of boys and girls, any way to get the almighty dollar! We need a great movement in this country of everybody getting back to the soil and trying to produce something, instead of trying to live off somebody else."

"In the last nine years the average age of fallen girls has dropped to 16 years, and according to the figures which Billy Sunday got from Washington, D. C., it is estimated that there are in America today 600,000 fallen doves, girls who have been betrayed. Of the 600,000, when asked 'where did you take your first step?', 375,000 said 'We took our first downward step in the public dance. 5000 girls are lost every year in the city of Chicago. With each passing year 5,000 girls slip out of sight, never to be seen again by parents or loved ones. In the city of Los Angeles, M. Faulkner, formerly a dancing master on the Pacific coast, whose own sister was lost to this awful life is now a professed Christian, and has denounced the dance and all its awful influence."

Frederick Schultz Jones, dean of Yale University, warns in the following statement, 'Pleasure, hysteria, inability to concentrate, self-indulgence and degenerating ideals are possessing the youth of the country. Such tendencies are perhaps more easily observed in the young, and the change was at first more noticeable in young girls than in men. I am convinced that it has come about gradually during the last ten years, and largely because of the influence of the dancing craze, the automobile and the moving picture.'"

Tonight there will be the children's chorus, and the topic will be "The Way Up Is Down." At 3 p. m. and 7:30 p. m. on Sunday there are to be great meetings for everybody. At the Sunday afternoon meeting the subject will be "Where did Cain get his wife?" and Mr. Anderson especially invites skeptics.

STATE FORESTER SAYS STANFIELD GRAZING BILL HITS CONSERVATION; INTIMATES RECENT HEARING FARCE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 20.—The subcommittee on public lands of the United States senate was openly hostile to the federal forestry department in its western hearings and that its meetings were so staged that stockmen, in reply to leading questions, told the stories that the committee members wanted them to tell was asserted here today by State Forester F. A. Elliott in commenting on the hearings now in progress in Washington on Senator Stanfield's grazing bill.

"The bill," said Mr. Elliott, "is the final outcome of the hearings of the subcommittee on public lands which made a trip through the west last fall with the purpose of investigating the situation. The committee was openly hostile to the federal administration of grazing in the national forests and arranged the stage so stockmen would have opportunities to tell their stories. The questions were frankly leading and designed to fill the records with the story which the stockmen wished to tell and which the committee wanted them to tell."

"The outcome of these hearings was the introduction of a bill, the passage of which would result in would have stockmen being granted vested or property rights to grazing in the national forests. It practically grants contracts to stockmen in perpetuity, and gives them the right to sell, lease or bequeath these rights to others. Furthermore it places no limitation on the maximum number of stock which can be grazed, and in this way will in many cases, lead to overgrazing. The authority of the federal officials is practically nullified in that the bill provides for appeals from administrative decisions of forest officials to state boards of three men who must have knowledge of the range and who must be appointed by the President of the United States. An appeal to the secretary over the board's decision would have to be based solely on the board's findings of fact, a provision which practically nullifies the administrative control of the secretary of agriculture."

"While the present administrative policy relative to grazing lands perhaps has its faults, nevertheless there are no such as to call for the passage of a bill which is directly in opposition to the conservation policies as inaugurated by Roosevelt. Any legislation of this character should give the federal government latitude to control and protect the national resources of the country. The government should have complete freedom in restricting grazing in areas where it is injurious to young growth or is a menace to watershed protection, or where adjustments may be required to meet the needs of reclamation or wild life."
