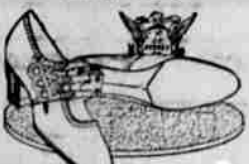

STOP COMMERCIAL FISHING TO SAVE STEELHEAD, URGED

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 22.—Recommendation that the Oregon Sportsmen's association sponsor legislation that would remove the state game commission from "the turmoil of party politics," was made by President C. C. Moore of the association at the opening session of the organization here today. He urged that the matter be brought before the legislature as proposed by the Multnomah hunters and anglers club.

Protection of the game fish streams from encroachment by commercial fishing also was stressed. Moore declared that all coast streams having their sources in the Cascades should be closed to commercial fishing in order to protect the steelhead. He suggested that the association go on record as favoring the referendum against the fishing measure which will take 10 per cent of game funds for the state general fund. Support of Senator Stanfield's senate bill No. 2089 which would cede Diamond Lake to the state as a game fish preserve also was urged. Eighteen delegates from county organizations were seated at the morning session.

AT THE ANDERSON MEETINGS

God Wants Every Man to Be Master of the Situation
And Spiritually Alive, Evangelist Tells Huge Audience
at the Amory—Music Special Feature Sunday Night.

"Let us have a clean Roseburg, a better and more beautiful Roseburg. And you church people can do it!"—Evangelist Harry O. Anderson.

A heavy rain last night did not keep the crowd from coming out to hear Evangelist Anderson. The Amory was filled. Music and sermon were excellent. The orchestra and choir were stronger than usual. Mrs. Stover rendered on the golden cornet.



The Holy City," assisted by the choir, and sang a solo; Mrs. Stover and Prof. Stout sang a duet. All of these numbers were fine, and were received by the audience with applause.

The preacher read from the sixth chapter of Isaiah of the vision that the prophet saw, and preached from Proverbs 29:18, "Where there is no vision, the people perish."

"My theme is, 'How far can you see?' Life is a matter of vision. When the Bible says, 'Where there is no vision, the people perish,' it does not mean that they cease to live. Jesus teaches us what the meaning of that word 'perish' really is, when He came to the wine skins, and the skins burst and no longer could contain wine. You will recall He said they 'perish.' They still existed but they no longer served the purpose for which they were made. They could no longer be used as wine skins, because they burst. So a man may, in outward appearance, seem to have all his faculties, but he is a lost soul outside of Jesus Christ. That is what the Bible means when it says to people who are unsaved that they are 'dead in trespasses and sins.' They have every physical manifestation of life, but the spirit is dead. God never intended for man to live on that plane. He intends for every one to be made alive in Jesus Christ, and when a man says 'no' to the Spirit of God and rejects Jesus Christ, he is living a life that doesn't please God who is not willing that any should perish, but that all should come to know Him, whom to know aright is life eternal. A man may believe about Jesus and he may believe about the church, but unless he has definitely taken Christ as his personal savior, though he lives he is dead. Not knowing Jesus Christ experimentally, such people perish. They still exist but they do not serve the purpose that God intended. God wants every man to be master of the situation, and spiritually alive. Vision does not mean something visionary. I have heard of evangelists and leaders today writing of visions they have received. That is not in keeping with the word of God. This book is a complete book. This is the standard, and not some dream of vision that a person may have had. And then the Bible is its own interpreter. It compares spiritual things with spiritual, scripture with scripture. When we turn to the sixth chapter of Isaiah, it tells us exactly what 'vision' is. He saw the

Lord, high and lifted up. But you say, 'doesn't the Bible contradict itself?' It is true that we read in John 1:18 that no man has seen God at any time. This is not a contradiction. What Isaiah saw was a manifestation of God. No one has ever seen God in His invisible reality.

"I can see God in nature. God talks to me in nature. When Joshua Miller stood at the Grand Canyon in Arizona, he said, 'It is God's paint pot.' When the biosomes came out, I see God. Don't you? When you plant the seed He puts life into it. When I stood in the Yosemite, God talked to my heart. I had a vision of God. I am sorry for you if you can't go out and see God in nature. But I am not one that just worships the God of nature. While God has spoken to us in nature, there is something that does not satisfy. We want to go a little farther. We want to know a little more. When a man stands at an open grave, the God of nature is not enough. The God of nature gives you no answer to the great question of life. I want something that tells me whether I shall meet my loved ones over there! God has revealed Himself in the Bible. Jesus said, 'I, in the volume of the Book it is written of me.' I read this book because it gives me a vision of God. Our religion is not merely a religion of books, but God has spoken unto us and given us a vision of Himself in Jesus. I can have a vision of God in nature, in the Bible and in Jesus Christ. I do not know where to find the philosopher or scientist of today who can explain Jesus out of history. Jesus said, 'when you see me, you see the Father.' Jesus was God tabernacling in the flesh."

"There is a vision of God through experience. The blind man did not know all about Jesus. He said, 'I don't know just exactly who Jesus is, but I have had an experience with Him. One thing I know, whereas I was blind, now I see.' He had the vision of experience. Where there is no vision of God the people perish."

"What we need is a vision of sin, and this is the greatest sin, that they believe not on the Lord Jesus Christ. Isaiah did not only a vision of sin, but he had a vision of salvation. The unseen One died for sinful ones. If you have no vision of the ground of your salvation, oh, that you might see tonight that He is your Savior! Isaiah had a vision of God, a vision of sin, and a vision of salvation. And last of all he had a vision of service. You are saved to serve. When you get to heaven you are going to keep on serving. You are a Christian that you may serve your fellowmen, and serve the living God. Jesus said, 'He that would be greatest among you, let him serve.' Where there is no vision of God, the people perish; where there is no vision of salvation, the people perish; where there is no vision of service the people perish."

There will be no meeting tonight. Tomorrow and on following days, the afternoon and evening meetings continue. The closing meeting will be held next Sunday night.

GOVERNMENT LOSES OREGON LAND SUIT

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 22.—The government today lost its suit in federal district court to force F. F. Macmillan and others to pay about \$75,000 for land they obtained by entry in Baker and Union counties in 1902.

The government charges that the defendants had used dummy entries, but Federal Judge Bean ruled that the evidence in that regard was "not at all sufficient."

It was a civil action, heard by the judge without a jury and the government sought merely to recover the value of the property. The trial occupied about two weeks.

Macmillan, according to the government, held residence in Iron River, Wis., while obtaining the land, but Judge Bean decided that he showed proper intention when he visited Oregon, saw the land, then returned to Wisconsin, where he told friends about the lands that could be obtained by entry.

Palmer's Record Bad.
MEDFORD, Ore., Feb. 22.—Joe Palmer, named as one of the state prison inmates involved in an assault upon a fellow convict, was a partner of Bill Short, alias Shannon. The latter covered Sheriff Jennings, head of a raiding party, with a rifle when discovered with an automobile load of moonshine last summer at his ranch at Applegate, while Palmer drove away and destroyed all the liquor, but one jugful, which was used as evidence. Palmer was arrested a week later.

Palmer is a former preliminary fighter of Los Angeles, and was a jail authority said at the time of his defection of "Tuffy" Reid, Los Angeles newsboy, hanged at San Quentin prison a year ago for a holdup and murder, after a desperate effort had been made to save his life on account of his youth.

To Weed Out Worst Ones.
SALEM, Ore., Feb. 22.—The "hard-boiled" and all other incorrigibles

confined in the Oregon state penitentiary will in the near future all be dressed in stripes and put to breaking rocks in the prison yard under a plan announced today by Warden J. W. Lillie, who, since he took office two months ago, has been carefully studying the problem of successfully employing convicts in productive industries at the prison.

Warden Lillie's plan contemplates the segregation of prisoners into three classes, according to their prison record, and the employment in productive industries of only those who have proven themselves deserving of privileges and the confidence of the penitentiary officials.

Upon being received at the prison convicts will be placed in the second, or probation class, where they will remain until they have classified themselves by the behavior and attitude toward the rules and regulations of the institution. Those who evidence a willingness to abide by the regulations and do the work assigned to them will be placed in the first class and rewarded with privileges approximating those conferred upon inmates, although they will not be allowed outside the walls. This class will supply the men to operate the tax department and other industries, supplemented by prisoners recruited from the probation class as they are needed.

Those of the convicts who fail to make good in the probation class and evidence an inclination to be unruly will be relegated to the third class and dressed in stripes. For them will be established a rock pile, located in the center of the prison yard, where they will be employed under constant gun guard.

"We think that practically all of the trouble we have in operating the prison industries comes through employing the 'hard-boiled' in those occupations," said Warden Lillie. "An attempt to burn the tax plant and other forms of sabotage with which we have to contend can all be traced to a comparatively few bad actors who do not work at the job they are in, and who will not stop at anything to get out of any kind of labor."

It is only one way to handle these fellows, and that is to put them where they cannot do any damage.

"Most of the prisoners comply with the rules and regulations strictly and do their work faithfully."

DEMOCRATS WILL ATTEMPT TO FORCE ALUMINUM PROBE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22.—Democratic leaders indicated today that they would ask for action by the senate to refer the case of the Aluminum company of America to a special counsel instead of pressing for a senate resolution for an investigation to determine whether the company has violated federal court decrees.

Senator Robinson of Arkansas, the party floor leader, said he thought a case was made on the record of the federal trade commission and that it seemed useless to pile investigation upon investigation.

Senator Walsh, Democrat, Mont., who has prosecuted the senate inquiry into the action of the Department of Justice in investigating the Mellon controlled company, said the plan outlined by Senator Robinson would meet with his approval.

The course to be sought, Senator Walsh said, would be similar to that followed in the Teapot Dome case where the president was directed to employ special counsel to "take such action, civil or criminal," as the facts might warrant.

Administration senators will oppose appointment of special counsel equally as strenuously as they have opposed a special senate investigation.

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EIGHTY-FOUR CARS OF BROCCOLI ARE SENT FROM COUNTY

Eighty-four carloads of broccoli have been shipped from Douglas county up to the present time. Of this number 74 have been loaded at Roseburg, 7 at Riddle, 2 at Myrtle Creek and 1 at Dillard.

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PROGRAMS GIVEN IN SCHOOLS TO OBSERVE HOLIDAY

Washington's Birthday was observed in this city today by a general display of flags, the closing of public offices, and the granting of a half holiday to the schools. All banks were also closed for the day.

A patriotic program was given in each of the schools this morning, general assemblies being held for that purpose. At noon the pupils were dismissed for the remainder of the day.

EUGENE MAN ASKS STRAPS ON SOUTHERN PACIFIC CARS

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 22.—George O. Goodell, formerly secretary of the public service commission, now in the insurance business at Eugene, has complained to the service commission that the Southern Pacific company refuses to put straps for the use of standing passengers in its street cars on Fairmount loop in Eugene. He claims the cars are often overloaded, although the company claims the contrary, and that not only the absence of straps offends, but also the practice of allowing baggage to accumulate at the entrance.

"The plain fact is," writes Goodell, "that the superintendent has bluffed this matter through so many times that he expects to continue doing so indefinitely."

WESTERGREEN, OREGON U. HOOPSTER GUARD, IS ILL

EUGENE, Ore., Feb. 22.—Illness of Algot "Swede" Westergreen, all coast guard of the University of Oregon basketball team, is causing some confusion as to the dates for the California-Oregon series for the championship of the Pacific coast, it became known here today.

Westergreen is reported to be quite ill, but physicians have been unable to determine whether it is a case of ptomaine poisoning or something else.

There is some talk of an operation, but until another consultation of four examining physicians, no further announcement will be made, it is said.

CHICAGO, Feb. 17.—Plans for a memorial celebration and offering in honor of Fanny Crosby, the blind hymn writer, have been prepared by Dr. S. Parkes Cadman, president of the Federal Council of Churches of Christ, in observance of her birthday, March 23.

Miss Elizabeth Doten of Boston has written a pageant of her life for use in Sunday schools.

"Fanny Crosby, in contrast with the jazz kings of today, died without having sufficient money to leave for an earthly memorial," said Dr. C. C. Marshall of Bridgeport, Conn., while at a church conference here. "She wrote thousands of hymns without compensation, such as 'Rescue the Perishing,' 'Safe in the Arms of Jesus,' 'Saved by Grace,' 'Draw Me Nearer.'"

"If Fanny Crosby were living today these hymns would net the writer a fortune. We who reverence her memory, have a two-fold purpose in erecting a memorial. One is a home for aged in memory of Fanny Crosby at Bridgeport, the second to keep her name in memory by observing a Fanny Crosby birthday."

DELAY IN COMPENSATION ACT OPPOSED BY LABOR

OMAHA MYSTERY SNIPER CAUGHT; ADMITS CRIMES

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

OMAHA, Neb., Feb. 22.—A man who admits being the "sniper" who shot and killed Dr. A. D. Searles, aged physician, here last week, and perhaps fatally wounding Ross Johnston, Washburn railroad officer, has been captured at Bartlett, Iowa, 40 miles southeast of here, the World Herald was informed today.

Under questioning the man also admitted the William McDewitt slaying here.

Dave Morgan, constable at Bartlett, two citizens and C. C. Bruce, railroad section foreman, captured the man who would give no other name than Carter. Bruce, recognizing the man by newspaper descriptions, had seen him walking the tracks toward town and hastened ahead of him to get aid to capture him.

When taken, Carter had a .22 calibre automatic pistol under his leather coat and readily admitted that he had done the Omaha shooting, according to information to the World Herald from Bartlett. The World Herald had posted a \$250 reward for the capture.

A grudge he held against Dr. Searles prompted the slaying, Carter is quoted by the World Herald as stating, while the shooting of morning.
