AT THE ANDERSON MEETINGS

Power of God Unto Salvation Is Topic of Inspiring Sermon Given Last Night—Men Give Wonderful Testimonies of Saving Power—Special Program for Young People Tonight.

"For I am not ashamed of the Gospel of Christ; for it is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth; to the Jew first, and also to the Greek."—Romans 1:16.

This was the text of Evangelist Anderson at the Armory last night. An impressive feature of the meeting was the crowding of about 125 men to the platform and choir loft, to give their testimony for Jesus Christ. Mrs. Stover rendered a cornet solo, with her usual skill, and Prof. Stout, by special request sang finely "The Sword of the Lord and Gideon," which was received with applause.

"I am not ashamed of the Gospel of Christ," said the preacher, "for it is the power of God, and that word in the original is the word from which we derive our word 'dynamite.' In other words, if I were to give a free translation of the text, it would say, 'I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ, because in that gospel there is dynamite.' There is energy, there is something that if you touch the match to the fuse it goes off in your soul, and there is power. I am not surprised that Paul should give us such a wonderful text, for when you read that first chapter of Romans, you read some of the blackest things that ever possessed the human heart. My teacher in Boston said it took him seven years of preaching before he felt the conviction as a minister that he ought to read that chapter in public. If you want to know how low and how black and degraded the human heart can go, read the first chapter of the book of Romans. I am not ashamed of the name of God. Some boast of sowing their wild oats. I do not understand why men are ashamed to take their stand for the pure things. I am not ashamed of the Gospel, because I know when Christ comes into the human heart, there is power and energy, and it is the dynamite of God. I know it works. I am not ashamed, because in Jesus is presented, first of all, a savior for a lost world. I do not know how to solve the problems of this world. There is pain and anguish, iniquity, disease, there is separation, misunderstanding, some are poor and some rich, some must struggle, some never struggle. The world to which Jesus came was black and dark and pagan. They treated men with contempt, the value of man was disregarded, the rights of man were not repeated. Men were treated as mere slaves, just as so much machinery. Woman, in that dark and pagan world, was a slave. In the world that Jesus faced, if they wanted to get rid of babies, they dumped them into the sewer. You can read it in the history of Rome. They would take a man, an ordinary laboring man, a slave, and throw him into the arena to the wild lions, and those in purple would shout and clap their hands, and say 'we want sport of the human blood.' One day there walked in a man, Jesus looked into that black, pagan world, and he said, 'What shall it profit a man if he gain the whole world and lose his own soul?' Jesus looked not at his clothes or social standing. He looked down into the soul of mankind, the lost, the most depraved and the farthest away, I believe in the Gospel of Jesus Christ, and I am not ashamed of it, because in that gospel is presented a Saviour for a lost world. Men today are just as truly lost as they were back in the first century, if they are outside of Jesus Christ. Unless you have definitely taken Jesus, you are a lost man. You say, 'Brother Anderson, I am just as good as people in the church.' May be you are, but I am not going to heaven that way. I am not going to heaven on my good works, but I am going to heaven on the blood of Jesus. I say to you, mortal man, as fine as you are, just as Jesus said to Nicodemus, 'You must be born again.' 'I am not ashamed of the Gospel because it not only presents a Saviour for a lost world, but this Saviour has a world agent. You can preach Him in China, and they understand, in Japan and they understand, in the islands

of the sea, and they understand the message. You go down into darkest Africa and lift up the Cross of Jesus Christ, and it sheds light and blessing in the open sore of the world. Did you ever stop to think how little Jesus had to do with, and what He accomplished? He came into a dark, black pagan world, penniless, wordless, partiless. There were five parties in His day, and He did not espouse one of them. You start a movement now, and the first thing you need is money. To put this campaign over, we had to have money to pay the bills. Did you ever stop to think that 1900 years ago, a lowly Nazarene trod the hills, preaching a wonderful doctrine, living a sinless life; that He lived only to the age of 33 years, and never traveled more than 135 miles away from home; born in a manger, and in three brief years put over a program that has gone clear around the world? That is the greatest power in all the world. He never wrote books. When we want to get something over now, we go to writing books. The only time He ever wrote was on the sand, and the waves effaced that. He was penniless and partiless. If you want to get some movement over, you say, 'Let us get somebody behind it, we need a party, we need group consciousness.' But Jesus stood absolutely alone. He showed Peter that He was not going to establish His kingdom by force. He said, 'I have another power. It will be lifted up. I will draw all men unto me.' And tonight you feel that drawing power. Tonight, Jesus lifts this wonderful power, and that power can come into your life and change it."

Tonight is young people's night at the armory, and the subject will be "Old Ship Zion." The meetings continue until Sunday night. On Sunday, the closing day, Mr. Anderson will preach at the Armory at 11 a. m., 3 p. m., and at 7:30 p. m.

PRICELESS WORKS RAPHAEL AND MORO FOUND IN FRISCO

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 25.—Two paintings, centuries old, one giving every evidence of being an original Raphael and the other an original Antonio Moro, have been found in San Francisco after "truly picturesque" careers. They have been certified as originals by art experts, who say that they are priceless.

The Moro, found in a drapery and tapestry shop by Michael J. Berdnikoff, an expert in the restoration of pictures, is the portrait of a sixteenth century woman done in oil. Over the picture were superimposed two other paintings on the original canvas, one a Syrian scene, and the other a flower scene. It was necessary for Berdnikoff to remove these two superimposed paintings by chemicals and a razor-sharp knife before he reached the Moro masterpiece.

The Raphael is a "Madonna and child," painted on an oak panel. It had passed through an adventurous career in a Tuolumne county mining camp where it was brought in 1849 by a member of a family in whose possession it has been for many years. It came into the possession of this family through purchase in New York.

PORTLAND BEAVERS
SECURE NEW HOME

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 25.—Location for a permanent baseball park for the Portland club of the Pacific coast baseball league was secured today by the club. The site, 500 by 600 feet, close to the business center, was purchased about a year ago by Thomas S. Skibe, of Philadelphia, president of the Philadelphia Americans, as a personal investment and he has now transferred title to the Portland club.

The club has a lease for two years more on the Vaughn street grounds and plans to have the new grounds ready when that lease expires. The new grounds will be located at the square bounded by Chapman, 20th, Jefferson and Market streets, not far from the Multnomah Amateur Athletic club.

RUBBER MAKERS
FORCE DOWN PRICE

NEW YORK, Feb. 25.—Rubber prices which have been steadily declining since the first of the year today broke as much as two cents a pound for some options, on the rubber exchange of New York, bringing current prices 4 1/2 to 6 cents a pound below last week's closing levels.

President F. R. Henderson of the exchange, in a view of the situation attributes the softening price tendency to the conservation program of American manufacturers following the marking up of the prices in London last winter to above \$1 a pound for spring delivery.

SEEK RECORD OF THOSE WHO SAW FIRST TELEPHONE

PORTLAND, Feb. 25.—A complete record of Oregon residents who attended the Philadelphia Centennial Exposition of 1876, and who saw and used the first telephone instrument exhibited there, is being sought by George H. Himes, Curator of the Oregon Historical Society in Portland. Mr. Himes has already located several Portland people who had this novel experience, and he believes that there must be a number of others throughout the state. Anyone who was present at the Centennial Exposition and who either saw or used the first telephone will doubtless be anxious to enroll his name with others who are qualified to be in this group.

The first telephone instrument was exhibited at the Philadelphia Centennial Exposition in 1876 by Alexander Graham Bell, its inventor. At that time it was looked upon by the few people who were interested in it, and by the brief press notices accorded it, as an amusing and interesting toy which probably could never be used to any practical advantage.

NEW MEAT AND POULTRY BUSINESS OPENS IN ROSEBURG

A new business house which is just being opened in the city, is a produce company, according to an announcement today.

The owner is M. H. Shook, who comes here from Halsey, Oregon, where he conducted a similar business for the past two years. He has leased the building at 226 West Oak street and has had it renovated and remodeled, and will do business under the name of the Valley Poultry and Produce Company. The firm will handle dressed meats, poultry, eggs, feeds, etc., buying direct from the farmers at current prices and selling both to the wholesale and retail trade, also shipping some of the produce to other markets.

Mr. Shook has been in the produce business since a boy, and is familiar with all aspects of his work, that go to make it an economical and successful proposition for both the producer and consumer, and it is apparent that he will meet with good success here.
