## PORTLAND YOUTH KILLED BY AUTO; DRIVER ARRESTED

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 25.—Seven-year-old James Clement, son of James F. Clement, manager of the national advertising department of the Portland Telegram, died early today as a result of being hit last night by a heavy sedan. Gilbert Cheney, 18, a high school boy, driver of the car, was arrested on a charge of reckless driving. Police said he admitted the car was going at a high rate of speed.

He said he saw a group of boys playing beside east 82nd street and that James Clement ran across the street. Cheney applied the brakes so quickly that the car skidded and fell over on its side, catching and dragging the youngster beneath it.

A complaint charging young Cheney with involuntary manslaughter was lodged today by Deputy District Attorney Neil Maloney, in information signed by Willes.

Meetings were held at Baker, La Grande, Arlington, The Dalles and Redmond, and a banquet was enjoyed with the Legion post at Bend.

"Interest in the American Legion is growing in every locality," Commander Stewart said upon his return. "Heretofore it has been an effort to gain new members, but now veterans are voluntarily renewing their memberships and are taking a keen interest in the work of the organization."

## HIGHWAY BRIDGE AT HARRISBURG HAS CLOSE CALL

EUGENE, Ore., Feb. 25.—High waters of the Willamette river yesterday threatened the new Pacific highway bridge spanning the river at Harrisburg, according to information received here today. A crew of 30 men worked all yesterday and up to 1:30 o'clock last night to save the structure.

The recent floods wedged out part of the revetment work and when the river again rose yesterday more of the revetment was washed out. For a time it seemed that the Lane county end of the bridge might go down.

All danger is now gone, it was said, as the river is receding, and the replacement work has progressed well.

Piling for the approach on the Lane county side was not driven deep enough to withstand a wash-out of the supporting soil and when the revetment went out there was no protection for the piling. The entire approach and a section of

Mr. Dennis announced that he had disposed of all his property interests in Union county, and contemplated buying a home in Portland.

## GARLAND'S FORTUNE SWELLED BY CAPITAL- ISTS HE SHUNS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)  
NEW YORK, Feb. 25.—Charles Garland, in the role of a visionary David, has slung a million golden pebbles in the face of the Wall Street Goliath, only to have that genial giant gather up his ammunition and return it several fold.

The capitalist's order against which Garland has thrown the weight of two fortunes aggregating more than \$1,000,000 has been working steadily to increase the endowment of the American Fund for Public Service, created by Garland for the promotion and support of "unfavorable causes," chiefly of radical nature.

Today the fund's original working capital of \$500,000, due to the rise in value of certain bank securities, is \$1,131,000. This despite expenditures during the last four years of \$325,000 and exclusive of outstanding loans of nearly \$300,000. Its capital today consists almost entirely of common stock of the First National Bank of New York.

"We are letting Wall Street earn our money for us," cheerfully observed directors of the fund, in preparing the 1925 report. The report shows that activities of Garland's fund range from socialist or labor newspaper subsidies and legal defenses for radicals to birth control propaganda and aid for coal miners in western Virginia.

Shortly after coming of age in 1922, Garland received a \$1,600,000 inheritance from his father, a Wall Street financier. After settling a large share of the estate upon his wife and year-old child, he endowed the American Fund for Public Service. He retained no share in the disposition of the fund for himself, leaving this function entirely in the hands of others.

EUCHARIST VISITORS GIVE "SPIRITUAL BOQUET" TO POPE  
CHICAGO, Feb. 25.—(A. P.)—A "spiritual bouquet" to Pope Pius XI will be offered by thousands of Chicago and visiting Catholics receiving communion and praying for the pontiff's intention at the opening of the International Eucharistic congress here June 26.

Since the congress is designed to celebrate and glorify the Eucharist, the Catholic sacrament of the real presence of Jesus Christ, under the appearance of bread, participation in communion will be stressed during the four-day sessions of the congress.

Visitors will be assigned by groups to various churches of the city for attendance at special Masses on the opening day. But thereafter they will gather in the outdoor church into which Soldiers' Field, Chicago's municipal stadium, will be transformed. To enable participation by a large number without the congestion and delay that was experienced at the 1922 Eucharistic congress in the Coliseum in Rome, a plan, similar to that used in the "sports park" in Amsterdam in 1924, will be employed.

Around the altar, on a slight rise to the north of the stadium, a quadrangle rail will be erected and around it the communicants will file, kneeling for a moment to receive the communion which will be distributed by a score of priests. Sixteen priests were employed for several hours in this distribution at the Amsterdam congress.

No communions will be distributed, except in parish churches, at any of the indoor meetings, of which the principal ones will be held at the Chicago Coliseum, scene of several national political conventions. Only phases of the congress' general subject, "The Holy Eucharist, the Christian Life" will be discussed here.

## NEW REFEREE FOR FINAL MEDFORD-ASHLAND GAMES

MEDFORD, Ore., Feb. 25.—Ralph Coleman, of O. A. C., has been named as referee for the final games of the Medford-Ashland basketball series, to decide the championship of southern Oregon. The third game will be played in Ashland March 5, and the fourth in this city March 6. The games were scheduled two weeks apart this year, for the first time, to give the fans of the two cities a chance to cool off between frays.

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 25.—The upward trend of values in the local fresh egg market continues unabated. Today standard extras and mediums are a cent higher than the daily exchange at 24 and 25 cents respectively. Fresh standard firsts are steady while current receipts eased off a fraction, being posted at 23 1/2 cents net.

Egg receipts are improving, due to the mild, open weather, but fresh offerings are absorbed rapidly and there is no surplus in the street. There is a good shipping outlet to the south and also a heavy local absorption. Low prices to the public are responsible for a big increase in the consumption.

Cube butter continues on the lower trend with top grades down a fraction again today. On the daily exchange extras and standards are both off half a cent at 46 and 45 cents respectively. Undergrade cubes remained steady at former levels. Prints and butterfat bids are also unchanged.

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
