PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 26.—Dairy products are generally steady in the local market with little change shown in prices and no definite trend. On the local exchange fresh standard eggs are a cent lower at 28 cents but other grades are posted at former levels.

Cube butter quotations are unchanged for the day and the market along the street is holding steady. Receipts are moderate with a fair demand.

Country dressed meats and live poultry are steady. Daily receipts have been light recently but sufficient for local requirements.

The local wool market has been showing some activity recently. The outstanding feature was sale of the big Smythe Brothers clip of 450,000 pounds at Arlington to Charles Webb of Philadelphia. The purchase price was reported at 33 cents.

Isadore Kosland, local dealer, purchased the Smithson lot at Elensburg for 33 cents, consisting of approximately 100,000 pounds, besides 50,000 pounds from Frank Da-

vin of Walla Walla for 28½ cents.
