MERCURY-TO-GOLD TRANSMUTATION IS FAILURE ON TRIAL

MONTREAL, Feb. 27.—German methods claimed successful for the conversion of mercury into gold are a flat failure, according to a paper published by Dr. H. Gordon Snelson and Dr. Roger S. Estay of New York University and read before the American Physical Society here today.

"During the past year we have repeated the mercury-to-gold transmutation experiments of Dr. Meitner of Berlin and we have not been able to produce the slightest trace of transmuted gold," they reported.

MONTREAL, Feb. 27.—Paul Langlen, ranked by the tennis courts today for the first time since her collapse at Beaumont, defeated the Misses Racine and Platt of England in the semi-finals for the Beaumont cup, 6-5, 6-0.

AT THE ANDERSON MEETINGS

Evangelistic Campaign to Come to End Tomorrow—
Sunday Services to Start with Sunrise Prayer Meeting at 6:41—Churches to Join in Union Morning Service—
Meetings Afternoon and Evening.

Gentle reader, is your Christianity equal to getting up at 6 o'clock tomorrow morning? If so, report at the Methodist Church at sunrise, namely, 6:41 o'clock, for the great prayer meeting. It will cut short your Sunday morning nap, but the palmist said, "Early will I seek thee." Other meetings tomorrow in the Anderson campaign are to be held at the armory at 11 a. m., 2 p. m. and 7:30 p. m. It will be the closing day of a successful campaign. Great things are expected. The subject tonight is "The Pre-eminent Man," and there is to be special music.

In addition to a solo by Mrs. Stover, the music last night included selections rendered by the Knight family orchestra, of which Roseburg is justly proud. They were heartily enjoyed.

"For ye know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sakes he became poor, that ye through his poverty might be rich."—2 Cor. 8:9.

Mr. Anderson preached last night from the text standing at the head of this column, and it was a strong sermon. "This text is in the midst of a chapter on giving," he said.

"Paul is writing to the church at Corinth, and he tells them, 'Take your collections, get them all out of the way, so that when I come there will be no gathering of money taken up. I think he was getting ready for an evangelistic meeting. Sometimes people say, 'I wish my pastor would quit preaching about money, and preach the gospel!' When you hear people say like that, just put it down that they are not reading the New Testament carefully. Jesus said more about money than He did about hell. When you read what Jesus said about the resurrection, and then read what He had to say about money, you will be surprised. All thru His ministry He emphasized sacrificial giving. He says your receiving is dependent upon your giving. God says, 'If you would have, give, and it shall be given you; how that which you have, and you will lose it.' A baby is born with its hands shut tight.

"The Bible says, 'when you get to be a man, put away childish things.' Open your hand! The Lord Jesus Christ was rich, but He became poor, that you, through His poverty, might become rich. I am not talking about material wealth, but I believe God does put material wealth into the hands of His people for what good they can do. But get it out of your mind that you are going to be contented, when you get and and gold. God gives everything. He says, 'If I take care of the sparrow, I will take care of you.' He wants you to get out of the plane of materialism, out of the plane of money-grubbing, and money-getting. My ideal is not to live for self, but for others. I like happiness, I like joy, I like service. If you want to know the joy of real living, take your church paper and read the missionary news, and write to the missionaries, and put a check in the letter. Are you like the stinky woman back in Pennsylvania? She put in ten cents, and asked the preacher to sing, 'God be with you till we meet again.' The only giving that counts in the sight of God is sacrificial giving."

"But I did not intend to preach tonight on giving, though the Bible has much to say about it. Jesus was rich, that is a wonder-

ful fact. We usually characterize him as the lowly Nazarene, but He was rich in three things. First, He was rich in the love He had from His heavenly Father. What is it that makes your home? It is not the piano or the hardwood floors or the carpet. It is mother's love, father's love. What would this world be without love? So Jesus was rich in the love He had with His Father. Secondly, He was rich in glory. He prayed to the Father to restore unto Him the glory that He had before the foundation of the world. The third thing is the outcome of the other two. He was rich in the heavenly and earthly possessions God gave Him. The Bible teaches that all that is created, principles, powers, dominions, no matter what it is, all were created by Christ and for Christ. Jesus, the matchless One, was wonderfully rich in these three things. He was not only rich, but the Bible says He became poor. It is wonderful that He was rich, but more wonderful that He became poor. If I had some magic power, by which I could go back to John D. Rockefeller, and say, 'John D. Rockefeller, you are rated as one of the richest men, but, hocus pocus! All you have is not yours any more, it is mine! Why, the News-Review would come out with an extra edition, announcing 'John D. Rockefeller poor! John D. Rockefeller broke!' We would all talk about it. If Ford should lose his millions, it would go clear around the world on the telegraph wires. But that is nothing to what happened 1906 years ago. Jesus was rich and He became poor. He stood before His accusers dumb, He answered not back, He knew that He was falsely accused, but He was to be made a sin offering. Suspended between heaven and earth, He made a prayer you can't find any other place. All during His life He said, 'My heavenly Father, I want to do the things that please you, I am here to do thy will. But there was one time, one place, where God could no longer look on His well-beloved Son, and that was the time when He became poor for you and me. It does mean that He became penniless. When He became poor for you and me was when He made the vicarious atonement for our sins. Suspended between heaven and earth, He prayed, 'My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me?' In that hour at Gethsemane He even God turned His face away, for God is holy and righteous, and cannot look upon sin. Jesus does not cry, 'My Father.' He is dealing with God, who is dealing with sin. In that moment He became sin for you and me. He became poor, and He carried all our sins away."

"So Paul sets up that wonderful example. He says, 'You know the Grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, that He was rich, yet for your sakes He became poor.' It is wonderful that He was rich. It is more wonderful that He became poor. The most wonderful thing is that we, through that offering, through Calvary's cross, through Jesus Christ, through His poverty, may become rich! And it can be done in the twinkling of an eye!"

**JOURNALIST WHO
OFFENDS FASCISTS
GETS OPEN THREAT**

ROME, Feb. 27.—A threat of violence against the Rome correspondent of the London Daily Express unless he leaves Italy was voiced today by Il Tevere, extreme Fascist paper, in an open letter to the president of the Rome Association of Foreign Press Correspondents. Il Tevere takes exception to the correspondent's recent story in which he said that Premier Mussolini was in such ill health that he was forced to live on a starvation diet. The paper declares:

"We Fascists do not desire to seek out this correspondent nor do we desire to be constrained to put him with our compliments under the hoofs of the horse on which the duce (Mussolini) takes his daily ride."
