FORD DEALERS TO START FIGHT ON UNJUST AUTO LAWS

"Protection for the Ford Owner" is the slogan adopted by a group of 25 of the leading Ford dealers of Oregon at a meeting, Friday night, at Eugene Saturday night. This slogan will be carried into every part of the state by a Ford caravan, the objective being the organizing of Ford owners, nearly 100,000 in number, against any increase in motor vehicle taxes and enactment of unnecessary and annoying regulatory laws, according to C. A. Lockwood, local dealer who was in attendance at the meeting.

Earl C. Simmons of Eugene, one of the leading automotive merchants of Oregon, former member of the Fish and Game Commission, head of the Eugene Chamber of Commerce and Eugene councilman, called the Ford dealer meeting. He was made chairman of a caravan committee, membership including Al May of Portland, Isaac R. Tower of Marshfield, R. C. Corvallis and C. A. Lockwood of Roseburg.

"Ford dealers have no personal axes to grind. This organization and this caravan are the direct result of constant and emphatic appeals from thousands of Ford owners."

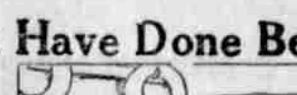
