## Umpqua Broccoli Exchange

Greetings:

We are in the midst of the largest harvest on record. California also has a large crop and the competition, from a selling standpoint, is very keen. We have the reputation of growing and shipping the best broccoli in the world. California stock, while not quite up to our standard of quality, is sufficiently good to offer severe competition, and this season they have a wonderful advantage in the fact that their heads are of a smaller, more uniform size. The consumer, having to choose between a large head, of fine quality, at a price of 40 or 50 cents a crate, and a small head of medium quality, at a price of 25 or 30 cents, is in the majority of cases taking the smaller head. This causes the jobber to seek cars with manifests showing heavy on tens, elevens and twelves. (Heads to the crate.)

If we are to attain the success to which we feel entitled we must, as far as possible, give buyer what he wants. I urge you to use every possible means to have 12 heads to the crate. If you cannot possibly get 12 in the crate, make it 11, an impossible to make 11, make it 10—and so on. Buyers in many markets will not even consider cars with a large proportion 7's, 8's and 9's—they demand 12's, and if we cannot furnish that size they buy in California.

These desirable sizes may be accomplished in three ways:

*Cutting at an earlier stage of maturity  
Closer trimming of the head  
A heavier, tighter pack*

The growers' welfare depends more on size and quality than upon the total number of crates harvested. It isn't so much "How many crates?" as it is "What kind of crates?" Be governed accordingly.

## PIONEER OF DOUGLAS CO. DIES SUNDAY

M. L. Bushnell, of Ten Mile, pioneer resident of Douglas county, passed away at his home at 11:30 o'clock Sunday morning following an illness of some time. Mr. Bushnell had been bedfast since Thanksgiving and gradually his condition became weaker until death followed yesterday. He was born in Iowa, and was eighty years of age.

When about six years of age, he crossed the plains with his parents, settling in Douglas county, and residing in the Ten Mile vicinity, where he farmed a good many years. Mr. Bushnell was well known here and made many fast friends. Surviving besides his wife are two children, Mrs. Emma Swift and H. S. Bushnell, both of Ten Mile; two sisters, Mrs. Lucetta Ollivanti and Mrs. Jasper Howard, also of Ten Mile; three brothers, A. S. Bushnell, of Ten Mile, and A. E. Bushnell, of Reston, and several grandchildren.

The funeral was held this afternoon at 1:30 o'clock at the Ten Mile Community Church, and services were read by H. W. Rimmell. Interment followed at the Ten Mile Cemetery.

## R. R. LABOR BOARD ABOLITION BILL PASSED BY HOUSE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, Mar. 1.—The Watson-Parker bill to set up new methods of settling railroad labor disputes was passed today by the house.

The measure, which now goes to the senate, would provide for abolition of the railroad labor board.

Final action was taken after the house had defeated 222 to 194 a motion by Representative Blanton, Democrat, Texas, to send the bill back to the commerce commission, with instructions to provide for enlarging the powers of an emergency board, which the measure provides as a last resort in settlement of disputes.

## NEWSPAPER MEN DEFY COURT ORDER IN MURDER TRIAL

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) BAY ST. LOUIS, Miss., March 1.—Although Circuit Judge Walter White announced that a call in the Hancock county jail awaited any newspaper reporter who makes public any testimony or purported testimony in the trial this week of Jesse Payne, charged with murder, several newspaper representatives were preparing today to "cover" the hearing.

The judge Saturday directed an order prohibiting publication of details of the trial, making it clear that contempt proceedings would follow any infraction of the order, with a jail sentence as the penalty. He announced that some newspaper men might get a "recess" in the trial but if they did "the court would get one too." He added that publication of "information or misinformation" concerning the case "would defeat the ends of justice."

The newspaper men, however, said today they intended to write the news as they would have done had not the judge's order been issued.

Payne is charged with the murder of William Mingo and J. H. McElmore, federal entomologists, whose bullet riddled bodies were found recently near Piquette, Miss. The trial will probably get under way Tuesday.

## LOCAL FIRMS GET BULK OF CONTRACTS FOR EQUIPMENT

After considerable deliberation the school board has let contracts for the purchase of approximately \$15,000 worth of furniture and equipment for the new senior high school building. The local firms of McKean, Darby & Baldwin, J. M. Judd and Ott's Mosaic Store received a large share of the contracts. Wherever possible the board made it a policy to buy through the local firms. The Roseburg concerns submitted much lower figures on many items than the outside firms, and on a few there was a wide disparity of prices favoring an outside company did the board accept outside proposal, except where the same supplies could not be procured locally. The total cost of furniture, equipment and apparatus will run around \$20,000.
