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SOLDIERS TO GET BENEFIT OF DOUBT UNDER BONUS LAW

MEFORD, Ore., March 5.—At a banquet given by the Meford American Legion post, at which he was the principal speaker, Governor Walter M. Pierce last night pledged his own and the support of the state bonus commission in the adjudication of state bonus claims on Jackson county lands. The governor further declared that the Meford irrigation district was one of the most successful of the state. Referring to land loans, the governor said: "In the event of any doubt, the benefit will fall to the soldier boys, who left home to do and die, when the country was in danger. The commission is behind the boys and often our decisions are encouraged by sentiment, but then, too, much cannot be expected of us."

WOMAN NOT WIFE OF PORTLANDER WHOM SHE KILLED

PORTLAND, Ore., March 5.—A coroner's jury last night found that Henry M. Isaacson, automobile salesman, came to his death Wednesday night as the result of gun shot wounds inflicted by Mrs. Grace Violette, also known as Mrs. Isaacson. Late yesterday the woman, under police questioning, admitted she had not been married to Isaacson, but had lived with him four years as his wife. She had been married twice, her first husband, Fred Black, was believed to have been killed in the war. She divorced her second husband, Melvin Violette.

PAYS TRIBUTE TO DR. LOUIS BANKS

John B. Horner, well known Oregon historian, writing in the March issue of "The Lariat" has the following to say regarding Dr. Louis Albert Banks, Edwin Markham and Homer Davenport: "Three American authors of note were born in Oregon, about seventy years ago. Their birthplaces are within a radius of seventy miles. They came of pioneer families, and they have been life-long friends. Their authors were Edwin Markham, Homer Davenport and Louis Albert Banks. But these men left the west to live in New York and Boston—great literary centers where books are made and exploited—which fact recalls a pretty legend carved on a Crenoma violin now in the possession of Mr. John Gill, of Portland. According to the legend the violin said: "In the woods I lived silent; But having departed I sing." That legend may apply to the gifted trio that once lived in "the continuous woods" where they were almost unheard, and afterwards departed to the great literary centers where admiring thousands listened rapt to the messages they brought and rendered so masterfully. Edwin Markham was born in Oregon City, is author of the greatest and most generally read American poem written during the last third century. Homer Davenport, born in the Wadwa Hills, received the highest compensation paid to any American cartoonist of his time, and his ability is recognized on both continents. Louis Albert Banks was born near Corvallis. He is author of more volumes of serious and lectures and inspirational addresses that have been widely read through the civilized world than any other man living. Oregon has always admired these gifted sons, notwithstanding the prolonged absence of Markham and Banks. The Oregon Writers' League is proud of them also. Though the society was born too late to tell our Homer how dearly we loved him, she will cherish his memory as a poet and gentleman. She christened a rose in honor of Edwin Markham, whom she afterward laureated; and she placed another star in her diadem by receiving Doctor Louis Albert Banks as a guest of honor, on his return to his native state where he will spend his remaining days."

BILL WIDENS AND EASES LAWS FOR WORLD WAR VETS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
WASHINGTON, March 5.—A bill designed to liberalize legislation affecting World War veterans has been approved by the house veterans committee which expects to report it the first of the week. It would provide for payment of \$50 a month for five years to tubercular patients after they have reached a condition of virtual recovery and would extend for two years the period for vocational rehabilitation work which expires in June.

The bill also would extend from next June until 1929 the time for converting war insurance and would make all veterans legislation applicable to 76 women who served in base hospitals in France. In the future the veterans bureau medical corps would be known as the medical service and its personnel would not have designations of rank as in the army. The bureau also would be given jurisdiction over the northwestern branch of soldiers home at Milwaukee and the Battle Mountain sanatorium in South Dakota.

LILLARD AND EDWARDS TO FIGHT AGAIN ON MARCH 26

Mack Lillard, bantam weight scrapper of Eugene, was in the city last night from Marshfield, where he arranged for a return match with Danny Edwards, the Portland negro, who won a hair-line decision over him in a four-round bout at Eugene last week. The second battle will occur at Marshfield on the 26th of the present month.

Lillard declares he was entitled to a draw in the first fight. He is confident he will be a victor in the second one. Lillard is very anxious to do his stuff again in a Roseburg ring, and bars nobody at his weight.

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MURDERED MAN'S MISSING VALET IS OBJECT OF SEARCH

NEW YORK, March 5.—District Attorney Amos Koyes, of Los Angeles, who is here investigating the long unsolved murder of William Desmond Taylor, found dead in his home in 1921, has had a long distance telephone conversation with Mary Miles Minter about it. Miss Minter and Mabel Norman, motion picture actresses, friends of the late film director, who were questioned at the time of his murder, are in New York and will be questioned again. Miss Minter called Mr. Koyes voluntarily.

"She wanted to know what phases of the case we were investigating and asked if she could be of any help," said Deputy District Attorney Davis.

Mr. Koyes also would be glad to talk with Miss Norman, if she cares to get in touch with him, Mr. Davis said.

Both officials were reticent. It would be impossible to give out any information as to reports that they have a clue to the whereabouts of Edward Sands, Taylor's former valet, Mr. Davis said. Sands dropped out of sight after the murder.

ROOSEVELT LIKELY TO TRY AGAIN FOR THE GOVERNORSHIP

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
NEW YORK, March 5.—The political atmosphere here is charged with speculation as to

what effect the return of Theodore Roosevelt from his trip to Asia and the candidacy of George E. Brannan for United States senator from Illinois will have on the approaching presidential and gubernatorial campaigns. Intimations by Mr. Brannan's candidacy might be prelude to a campaign by Governor Smith for the Democratic nomination in 1928, or that the government would go to Illinois to campaign for the man who supported him in 1924, were met by a disclaimer from Governor Smith in Albany yesterday.

"If any such arrangements have been made, I don't know anything about them," he said.
