The Evening Mode Is Varied

The Simplicity of the Youthful Frock Is Contrasted With the Jeweled Movement in the Matron's Gown—The Flare Plays an Important Part in the Mode



There is a brilliancy about the midseason mode for formal occasions that vies with the glitter of northern snows. Whether the frock goes smilingly south, or bravely north, it bears a dewdrop gleam which is both becoming and smart.

In general the flare is emphasized in the newest models. It may start from a fitted waistline, or a low placed girdle. It may fall straight from the shoulder, or from a girdled natural waistline. But where it comes from is unimportant in the sense that its presence makes it distinguished.

The youthful type of formal frock differs from the more matronly costume in that the debutante's dress is fluttering and sparkling in its design and treatment. Chiffons, nets and tulle all form an ideal fabric in creating the youthful dance frock. Its lines of quaint appeal are best shown in these transparent materials, and they also are most happily blended with rhinestones, pearls and silver embroidery.

The simple bodice gown, with its low cut corsage is usually well adapted to the bouffant lines of the skirt. Floral decorations and ribbon girdles and applique of floral patterns are all becomingly used.

good results. In transparent lace and chiffons it forms a fluttering line which is graceful to the extreme.

The gowns worn by older women, or those whose type demands an exotic expression, frequently find vivid tones in metallic materials, gold or silver tissues or heavily beaded designs, most effective.

Paris has declared the beaded gown at the height of its vogue. Beads in gold and silver, in crystal and in pearls are to be found elaborating the most simply cut frocks. Designs of rare charm and intricate patterns create a vivid contrast to the simplicity of the chiffon frock.

The lemon green shade which is so effective in delicate fabrics is chosen for many of the new dance frocks. Its combination with gold is particularly beautiful. White, too, is smartly chosen for almost any type of gown and is successfully combined with silver.

Lois Moran, who appears in the First National film, "Just Suppose," has selected a costume for this picture which successfully meets the demand of youth in every line.

It was designed by Charles LeMaire and unites a delicate shade of pink and silver in lines of simplicity and charm. Bouffant with flounces of tulle it adds a simple floral decoration and ribbon of soft blue.
