Clatsop county forest fires in 1925 burned over 12,784 acres. Grants Pass—Josephine county farmers will plant heavy crop of onions.

Newport—Martin & Ryekman will build tourist "town" at their fish hatchery. Newberg—Cannery plans to increase last year's output by 250 per cent.

Albany plans to build a \$150,000 city auditorium. Astoria—Salmon canneries open early with exceptional run of fine fish.

Lebanon—Work will be resumed on Lebanon-Albany and Santiam highway. Hood River—Apple growers receive \$206,000 payment on 1925 apple crop.

Eugene—Five university societies buy lots, and will build chapter houses. Rainier—Menefee sawmill will resume cutting April 1.

Roseburg 167 carloads broccoli shipped from Douglas county, up to Feb. 25. North Bend—Stout Lumber Co. rebuilding burned mill and running other mill double shift.

St. Helens—Semi-Weekly "Mist" newspaper sold to Ira B. Hyde and George B. Borden, of Portland. West Coast Power Co. with plants at Burns, Toledo, Newport, Reedsport and Cathlamet, sold to Chicago capitalists.

Contracts let for concreting all Naton cut-off tunnels. Waldport—Eastern blueberry culture being tried, as promising industry here.

Pendleton—Umatilla project farmers will double 1925 acreage of potatoes. Grants Pass—Heavy plantings of early cabbage will be tried here this year.

Heavy snowfall in the mountains insures ample irrigation water for 1926. Portland—Northwestern Electric spends \$155,000 for adequate transmission exchange line, between east and west sides.

Portland—Portland Electric Power Co. will issue common stock under new plan for heavy expansion program this year.



DEATLY CHATS

WHERE YOU DON'T SEE. You cannot possibly keep the skin clear down your back and across your shoulders if you do not have a large bath brush of some sort, preferably with a curved wooden handle.

But not all of us have this particularly invigorating kind of shower bath, and few of us can reach behind our shoulders. And as long handled bath brushes cost only a dollar and often half as much in sales, they seem to be the answer.

You must remember that though the lower part of the back is protected by light or white underclothing, the special part around the shoulder blades is not. Frequently dark wooden clothing rubs against it all day long, rubbing in a certain amount of eye and dust.

The treatment is easy enough, if the skin is muddy or full of large pores back here. Lather the bath brush with any good, mild soap and scrub and scrub, using warm water, and when you dry yourself, take the towel by each end, and pull it vigorously back and forth over the shoulder blades.

No matter how bad the skin has been, a few weeks of this treatment will clear it. It will more than pay you for the trouble.

BRONCHITIS.

Whenever you see the termination "itis" to a word, you will know it means an inflammation. So, Bronchitis means inflammation of the mucous membrane of the bronchial tubes.

Most patients give the history of catching cold, and a cold is the cause in most cases of true bronchitis. Dust and gas inhalation, specific infections (as in whooping cough, diphtheria, scarlet fever and measles), various disturbances, disturbance of the heart, and many other things will cause the mucous membrane to become inflamed.

Symptoms: The cough is the most common symptom. It is present in some degree in all cases. There is a feeling of tightness and sometimes pain in the chest. Usually the cough is dry at first, but later, as the mucous membrane secretes more mucus, the cough is associated with expectoration.

Unless the inflammation is aborted then this expectoration which is first mucous in character may become purulent (pus like). Usually there is a slight rise in temperature, and headache is not uncommon.

The preventive treatment is to keep the resistance as high as possible by correct diet and other hygienic measures (correct diet undoubtedly the most important) and if you catch a cold and it is severe, to go to bed.

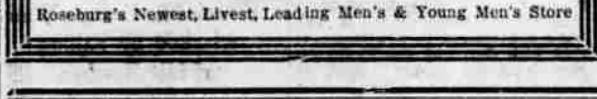
