SQUIREL POISON IS PREPARED FOR RODENT CAMPAIGN

Large quantities of poisoned grain are being prepared by Mr. J. P. Hanson from the Department of Biological Survey, who is assisting B. W. Cooney, County Agent, in the spring campaign against the digger squirrel.

This poison bait can be secured from the office of the County Agent, and also practically every grocery store, at actual cost for the material which is used.

During the first few weeks of bright spring weather, is the most economical season for poisoning this noxious rodent pest. The majority of the crops upon which the squirrel feeds, has not come on and the rodent is hungry and searching for food. At this season a small amount of bait, well placed, will bring a satisfactory kill, which will save thousands of dollars to the farmer by the end of the year.

CAMPAIGN AGAINST WINE AND BEER IS BEING MAPPED OUT

STAFFED BY WORK ON GRAZING BILL

WASHINGTON, March 8.—Final agreement on the question of regulating grazing on the public domain was reached in a conference today between Chairman Stanford of the senate lands committee, and Secretary Work.

NEGOTIATIONS are still under way between representatives of the committee and of the agriculture department with regard to regulating grazing in a national forest and agreement is expected later today. The agreement between the committee and the two departments, Chairman Stanford believes will eliminate all opposition to grazing regulations except by eastern interests which have opposed any form of legislation on the subject.

ASSOCIATED PRESS TO BROADCAST ITS PEERLESS SYSTEM

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
NEW YORK, March 8.—The work of the eighty thousand men and women who gather and distribute news for the Associated Press, will be explained tonight from the broadcasting stations throughout the country by executives and editors of the cooperative news gathering organization.

A growing interest among the newspaper readers in the manner in which news of the world is gathered and brought to their homes is responsible for this innovation. Hitherto the Associated Press has confined itself to giving its readers a glimpse of its own workings.

The phrases, "By The Associated Press," or the abbreviation "AP," appears at the head of news dispatches, which, it is estimated, are read every day by fifty million persons. Tonight the world-wide organization notified thus, and some of the stories behind the stories that appear in print will be explained briefly to radio listeners.

At the western divisional headquarters the talks will be broadcast from KFO, San Francisco. Other stations in the west will also broadcast, these being KGV, Portland; KMQ, Spokane; KFOA, Seattle; KJR, Seattle; KSL, Salt Lake; KXN, Los Angeles, KOA, Denver and KFAD, Phoenix.

MOUNTED POLICE IN NEW YORK USE CLUBS ON STRIKERS

NEW YORK, March 8.—A platoon of police, some of them mounted and others using their clubs, dispersed 500 striking workers today, when they attempted to hold a demonstration at Seventh Avenue and West 24th street. One hundred men and 25 women strikers were arrested on charges of disorderly conduct. Several strikers were hit by the policemen's clubs, but none was seriously injured.

The disturbances were the first of an importance since 12,000 workers in more than two thousand shops went on strike February 18, after some of the employers had ordered a lockout of their workers.

AVIATION FIELD, GIFT OF SEATTLE, PASSES TO GOVT

WASHINGTON, March 8.—The Sand Point flying field, near Seattle, became the property of the Navy Department today, when deeds to the 400-acre tract were delivered to Secretary Wilbur. A delegation which presented the deeds was headed by the two senators from Washington and included Representatives Miller and Hadley of that state; Colonel H. A. Hanson, deputy prosecutor of King County, Washington, and J. J. Underwood, representative of the Seattle Chamber of Commerce.

The property was donated by citizens and by King county and becomes the naval air station for that part of the north Pacific coast.
