DR. BANKS FORCED TO HALT MEETING BY ILL HEALTH

SPRINGFIELD, Ore., March 8.—For a new member of the Springfield Methodist church on Sunday morning, as a result of the work of Rev. Albert Banks, who has been conducting a series of special meetings, Rev. J. T. Moore announced today.

Rev. Mr. Banks left suddenly this morning for his home in Roseburg, when it became evident that unless he discontinued his work at the present time, he would suffer a breakdown. It is thought that after a two-weeks' rest at his home, he will be able to open his engagement at the First Baptist Episcopal church in Salem, March 21.

The evangelist, who is about 70 years of age, held a series of meetings in Springfield 47 years ago.

AL G. BARNES IN COURT FOR CHAINING CRAZY ELEPHANT

LOS ANGELES, Cal., March 6.—Al G. Barnes, circus owner, has a hot spot in his heart for wild animals, and especially for Tusko, one of the largest elephants in captivity, who "went bad" some time ago and was sentenced to death after he had killed a trainer. Barnes, between whom and Tusko was an attachment of many years' standing, ruled that the animal should not die, but should be imprisoned for life, which might mean a century or two.

Now Barnes and two of his assistants are charged with cruelty to animals and a jury will have to decide whether the quality of mercy was overstrained when the circus owner saved the huge beast from death.

A Consolidated Press association dispatch telling of the commutation of Tusko's penalty was read by Mrs. Rosamond Rae Wright of the American Animal Defense league, who called a meeting of 12 humane organizations of Los Angeles and vicinity.

The meeting ordered on investigation and a committee headed by Dr. John McLeellan visited the circus headquarters at Culver City. Dr. McLeellan reported that the elephant was chained to the floor in a concrete pen and that he believed the animal was cruelly treated, although close investigation could not be made owing to the danger of entering the pen. He said complaints to the circus officials received no attention.

Following Dr. McLeellan's report, Mrs. Wright filed information in court at Long Beach against Barnes and two circus employees, who were held for trial March 10. Barnes made a technical plea of not guilty at the preliminary hearing.

"No baby is better cared for than these animals," Barnes declared in a vigorous denial that any animal in the circus ever had been maltreated.

"Tusko is especially well treated. He is insane and must be isolated and chained for his own safety, but he is not abused. In his prime he was one of the best known elephants in the country. He loved children and enjoyed the fuss the little ones made over him. He considered me his particular friend until his mind became clouded and his memory of persons was lost. I did not have the heart to let him be killed, but because I was merciful, I am arrested and branded as a stony-hearted male factor."

TIME EXPIRING FOR RENEWAL OF GOVT. WAR INSURANCE

PORTLAND, Ore., March 8.—Over 140,000 beneficiaries of deceased World War Veterans are receiving government insurance payments involving awards amounting to more than a billion and a quarter dollars, according to a statement issued by Kenneth L. Cooper, Oregon Regional Manager of the U. S. Veterans' Bureau at Portland.

"This indicates in some measure the importance to every ex-serviceman in the state to have his war insurance renewed and converted into a permanent form of government policy before July 2 of this year, the time limit set by congressional law for such reinstatement and conversion," declared Mr. Cooper.

"We are eager to have every war veteran in the state of Oregon advised that unless a converted or permanent form of government insurance is taken prior to July 2, the privilege of having this government benefit will be denied him forever. The term insurance automatically ceases on this date."

The Red Cross, The American Legion and other service organizations are supporting this movement to have every veteran who had war insurance avail himself of his rights before it is too late. Mr. Cooper stated that despite the fact that 5,674 ex-servicemen and women of Oregon have applied for government insurance amounting to more than twenty million dollars, there are still thousands of war veterans who have not reinstated their war policies and many who have failed to convert same.

CITIZENS MILITARY TRAINING CAMP STARTS JUNE 19
