NEWS GLEANINGS FROM ALL PARTS OF THE WORLD

"Athletic heart" has been the reason for the exemption of so many young men from French army service recently that the authorities are taking measures to combat this evil.

Long distance foot racing, especially in the district around Paris, has become one of the most popular forms of sport in France, attracting many aspirants for honors who are their own trainers and do not attain proper condition to undergo the strain of distance running.

Army doctors are lecturing the young men who are found to "have broken down hearts" as the French call them, and calling on them to spread the doctrine of more careful training for athletes. This propaganda is said to be bearing fruit already in fewer exemptions for "athletic heart."

France is in a state of badly strained nerves, asserts Louis Marsolleau, poet and journalist, in

explanation of recent phenomena indicating high tension among the people. He blames the politicians in and out of parliament, for having reduced the country to a state of irritability that can only be calmed, he believes, by some form of violence.

He cites two recent incidents which he considers typical. The favorite in a horse race got off to a bad start and was beaten. The disappointed backers pulled the jockey from his horse and beat him nearly to death. Race track crowds in France often have shown feeling against a losing jockey, but not such uncontrolled savagery.

An American film shown at Bordeaux portrayed King Louis XI and the Dauphin in a manner the French audience considered unfavorable to those long dead personages. Such a disturbance arose after the police had to clear the house.

FRANCE RENEWS TALKFEST OVER DEBT TO AMERICA

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

WASHINGTON, March 11.—France has reopened discussion with this country for settlement of her \$4,000,000,000 war debt. Ambassador Berenger, the newly appointed French envoy, here, has pointed in conversation on the subject with Secretary Mellon.

While the secretary declined to discuss the negotiations in detail, it was disclosed that he had advised President Coolidge that settlement of the French debt hinged to some extent upon the action of congress on the Italian agreement, now under fire in the senate.

It is believed, therefore, that the French negotiations will not be hastened until the senate acts on the pending debt pact.

The French debt is the largest remaining to be settled by the debt commission. Several ineffectual efforts to make a funding agreement have taken place since the close of the war.

SAN DIEGO, Cal., March 11.—Kate Richards O'Hara, charged by the Hammer club, an organization of American war veterans, with being a radical lecturer and with having been convicted during the World war of violation of the espionage act and sentenced to a term in federal penitentiary, will not be barred from speaking at the open forum in the Unitarian church here next Sunday night. It was announced today by the board of directors of the open forum.

government should countenance betting on such uncertain animals as horses and at the same time refused bettors facilities for wagering on their favorite motor car drivers.

Newspapermen of Paris are to have an identifying badge issued them by the police to save them broken heads and bruises when their duties carry them into the middle of riots or other public disturbances. This is the result of a protest by the journalists that the police, in quelling outbreaks in the streets of Paris, have failed to distinguish between newspaper men and active participants in the disorders.

There are approximately 20,000 "lost" husbands in England, and although rewards have been offered, no news of them can be obtained. The board of guardians in various localities, who are responsible for maintenance of the dependents of missing men, are eager to find these husbands because the authorities are spending many thousands of pounds on "poor relief" for their wives and families.

The guardians say that many of the men found it impossible to settle down to humdrum life after their wartime experience and "have taken to the road," knowing that their wives and children would be cared for by the authorities.

At a time when German cities are being plastered with huge yellow posters saying, "not a cent for the Prussians," a contest with the question of further money or property grants to the former ruling houses, many members of the provincial royal families are spending the late winter in Switzerland.

The press of the left is making political capital out of the winter holidays. It reprints extracts of hotel registers at Bayreuth, showing several royal guests.

"That's where our money goes," laments a socialistic daily.

The efforts of the young miss of 1924 to look willow were criticized by Sir Bruce Porter, consulting physician of the American relief administration, after the war, in a London speech.

"Why girls want to look like weak and weedy young men, I cannot imagine," he said. "But they will get that figure and with it, indigestion and a great risk of consumption. Why should the fair-skinned and strong—sex try to copy the worst points in young men?"

Sir Bruce declared it was more than a tragedy to see so many girls "get willow" figures. "Do not let your daughters cultivate that figure," was his advice to mothers. "The craze will not last and it does not make for a happy old age, if they ever reach it."

James Gleason has been a kindly received by the London critics as an American actor who has visited England in a decade. His appearance in "Is Fat Set" of which he is also coauthor, has been greatly heralded in the London papers as the greatest laugh America has given London since "Putnam and Periwinkle" struck England.

The critics acclaim Gleason, in the role of the prizefighter promoter, and Robert Armstrong as the lightweight fighter, as one of the funniest teams London has seen in years. The ability of the British public to understand the New York slang and follow the rapid patter of the comedians is ascribed by several critics to the influence of American films.
