### OPPOSITION IS VOICED TO TOLL BRIDGE AT RAINIER

The Roseburg chamber of commerce in a telegram wired today to Representative W. C. Hawley in congress, voiced opposition to the proposed toll bridge at Rainier, unless the approval of the highway commissions of Oregon and Washington is given. The telegram was as follows:

"The Roseburg Chamber of Commerce opposes the construction of a private toll bridge over the Columbia at Rainier unless the approval of the state highway commissions of Oregon and Washington is required under the enabling act in addition to federal authority. We urge your opposition to any legislation that will result in hampering free passage of ships and request your support of the stand taken by the Portland Chamber of Commerce."

### FARM NEWS

#### BROWN ROT CONTROL

(By B. W. Cooney.)

Brown rot fungus disease of stone fruits is too well known to growers to call for any description. There is, however, a need for greater knowledge of control methods.

The full control of this disease depends largely upon a number of factors. Fortunately the major number of factors are within the grower's control. Satisfactory control measures are acknowledged to be costly and each grower must solve his own problem insofar as production economics are involved.

It is not the purpose of this article to enter into details regarding the life history of this disease farther than to state that one prolific source of the disease comes from mummied fruits on the ground or previously plowed under. Spores from these fruits will appear at about the same dates of blooming and should be destroyed by early cultivation.

The first application of spray should be made as the tips of the flower petals show white, using lime-sulphur 1 to eight or Bordeaux mixture 6-6-50 formula. The second application should be made shortly after the flower petals have fallen, using lime-sulphur 1 to 15 or Bordeaux 4-4-50 formula. The third application should be made with Bordeaux 4-4-50 formula during early August.

In the case of cherries and apricots we have another disease very similar in effect to brown rot disease, but more damaging in its effect upon these fruits as this disease will destroy the fruit spurs as well as blast the fruit bloom. To control the disease timely and thorough work must be the rule coupled with good materials. Bordeaux mixture has given us the best control of any fungicide yet tried.

First spray as flower petals begin to show white, using Bordeaux 6-6-50. Second spray three or four days after full bloom, using Bordeaux 4-4-50. Third spray as young cherries are pushing off the corolla or flower husk using 4-4-50 Bordeaux. Many growers will think this program consists of just one spray after another and so it does, but orchard demonstrates covering more than three years indicate that a less number will not suffice.

The county agent's office has a supply of Farmers' Bulletin No. 1410 entitled "Control of Brown Rot of Prunes and Cherries in the Pacific Northwest," Station Circular No. 53, "Brown Rot and Related Diseases of Stone Fruits in Oregon," give added information upon these diseases.

The annual loss from this one fungus disease is now costing Douglas County growers well over one hundred thousand dollars.

PORTLAND, Ore., March 11.—

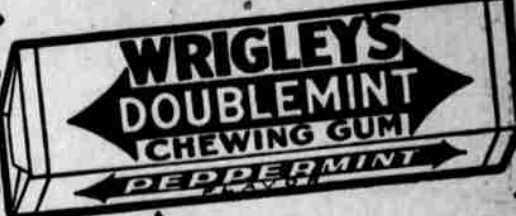
