## CHINESE FORT HITS JAP VESSEL: THREE MEN HURT

PEKING, March 12.—While two Japanese destroyers were proceeding up the Pei river below Tientsin today they were fired on from the forts near the mouth of the river held by troops of the Kuomintang (national army). Machine guns and field batteries were used in the bombardment. One Japanese officer and two men were wounded. The Japanese decided to abandon the attempt to move up the river and the destroyers returned to Tangu, near the mouth of the river, where two Japanese destroyers are lying.

It is not clear whether the Japanese returned the fire of the forts.

The Japanese consul general at Tientsin has lodged a strong protest with the Kuomintang leaders.

PEKING, March 12.—Immense crowds honored the memory of Sun Yat-Sen, first provisional president of China and leader of the Kuomintang (national party) at an elaborate observance of the first anniversary of his death, staged today in the new Ho Ping Park in the imperial city, a section of Peking.

NEW YORK, March 12.—The army transport St. Michel, sailing today, carried six hundred foreign service troops for the relief of United States garrisons in China, the Philippines and Hawaii.

### APPAISERS CITED IN CONTEMPT PROCEEDINGS

PORTLAND, Ore., March 12.—Dr. J. W. Morrow, Fred L. Olson, C. W. Pallett and Frank C. Robinson were cited today by presiding Circuit Judge Stevenson to appear in court March 22 and show cause why they should not be held in contempt of court for filing an application recommending investigation of the activities of the

American Securities company, the Mortgage Bond company, the Second Northwestern Finance Corporation and the Western Finance Corporation and the transfer of the assets of these companies to the Oregon Trust company. The appraisal, according to Elton Watkins, attorney who petitioned for the order, was filed in violation of an injunction order issued Wednesday by Judge Stevenson.
