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WIFE OF 24, MORALLY DEFICIENT, SUBMITS TO SURGEON'S KNIFE.

MEDFORD, Ore., March 18.—Thomas Trudeau, of Gold Hill, 63 years old and the father of 24 children, who entered a plea of guilty recently to a statutory offense, and was paroled from a three years penitentiary sentence, upon his promise to submit to a surgical operation, fulfilled that pledge under the auspices of the State Eugenic Society last Saturday. It was learned today.
The operation was performed at Trudeau's request, and he signed a statement absolving the state of all the blame, if he was impaired mentally or physically.
The operation, according to District Attorney Newton C. Chaney, was performed at Trudeau's own request by the State Eugenic Society.
In the signed statement, prepared by Trudeau's attorney, Frank Desousa, the patient sets forth that he believes the operation will improve his physical condition, "and better enable me to support my family."
Trudeau is the main support of a wife and ten children.

PORTLAND, Ore., March 18.—Liberal arrivals of fresh receipts are forcing a lower trend in the local egg market and values are a half to one cent lower for the day. Fresh standard extras are down to a 24c top with current receipts at 22c. Other grades are unchanged.

Although production is increasing, there is quite a heavy movement into storage and prices are not expected to work much lower. There are now more than 24,000 cases reported in local coolers.

Receipts yesterday totalled 1,562 cases besides stocks received by numerous small dealers who are not reported to the exchange. Butter continues steady and un-
