HANEY ADVOCATES SUBSIDIZING OF THE MERCHANT MARINE

PORTLAND, Ore., March 19.—Subsidizing the merchant marine would cost a relatively small sum and would be the safest guarantee of national prosperity for the

United States, Bert E. Haney, former member of the Shipping Board, said in an address here last night. Although subsidizing the merchant marine might cost the country fifteen to twenty millions annually, this would be less than that paid by the government for many less important things, Mr. Haney said. "The very people who

are opposed to subsidy for the merchant marine are for a high protective tariff. How are you going to support one and not the other?" he asked. "The Shipping Board method is the wrong way to run this thing," he added.

WALLOWA COUNTY WELCOMES ADVENT OF NEW INDUSTRIES

LA GRANDE, Ore., March 19.—The Black Marble and Lime company, of Wallowa county, will begin operations this summer, it is announced by J. T. Bellevue, formerly of Seattle, Wash., who arrived at Enterprise this week to take charge of the burning of lime for the company. Bellevue says the lime rock is greater in quantity than any deposit in Washington, and that there is enough in Wallowa county to operate plants for centuries.

Crushing equipment is expected to arrive at the Enterprise quarry in July and the production of land plaster and hydrated lime will begin as quickly as possible. Wallowa county farmers, organized in the Alder Slope Ditch company, will construct an irrigation ditch seven miles in length in the Alder Slope territory, near Enterprise, drawing their supply of water from the Wallowa river and Hurricane creek, which streams have been filed on by the farmers. The canal will irrigate a large acreage of land hitherto without sufficient moisture. Construction will start this spring.

PAPERS RECEIVED FOR EXTRADITION OF ELMER SLATER

Sheriff Starmer this morning received the extradition papers for Elmer Slater, alias Shirley, wanted in this county for possession of a still and jail-breaking. Slater was recently arrested in Bakersfield after having been a fugitive since the first of the year. He escaped from the county jail by tunnelling through the wall, making a getaway in company with Russell Carpenter. Slater was traced to California and finally was found in company with a woman friend at Bakersfield. He is now being held in jail there awaiting the arrival of Douglas county officers. Extradition papers were applied for several days ago and arrived this morning. Sheriff Starmer will leave tomorrow morning for Sacramento where he will present the papers to the governor of California and will then bring his prisoner back to Roseburg.

Land Suit To Be Heard. Another interesting suit will be heard by the Supreme court next week, that being the case of Phipps against Stanciliff. Mr. Phipps is the owner of a large tract of valuable farming land near Dillard. Several years ago the government opened the O. and C. grant lands to homestead entry and Mr. Stanciliff took up a tract of 21.5 acres in the very midst of Mr. Phipps' farm. The latter filed ejectment proceedings and the case was entered in the Circuit Court.

Mr. Phipps claimed that his predecessors had occupied the lands for many years, that the property had been transferred to him by deeds and that it had been fenced and in cultivation for so many years that the law of possession had operated against it and that he should be declared the rightful owner.

Mr. Stanciliff alleged that Mr. Phipps' predecessors in interest had acquired land all around the tract and that they had fenced in the piece and that they had converted it to their own uses. Title, however, he declared, remained in the government and when the lands were opened to entry that he was justly entitled to claim the property. The case immediately developed into a hard legal battle. The defendant filed a demurrer to the plaintiff's reply, and the demurrer was sustained by Judge Hamilton. The case then went to the Supreme Court on an appeal from the lower court's decision on the demurrer. Judge Hamilton was upheld and the case then came back for trial. Judge Hamilton heard the case and gave a decision for Mr. Stanciliff, and an appeal was taken to the Supreme Court. Judge Hamilton was again sustained, but a rehearing was granted and on a fourth to three decision the case was remanded to the lower court for re-trial.

Jury Gives Verdict. This time a jury heard the case and brought in another verdict for Mr. Stanciliff, and again an appeal has been taken to the Supreme court. Lengthy briefs have been prepared setting forth the pleadings and arguments of the case which has been dragging through the courts since 1920, and which has already been heard by the Supreme court three times and now goes up for the fourth hearing.

Mr. Phipps is represented in this action by Attorney B. L. Eddy and Attorneys Wimberly and Cordon appear on behalf of Mr. Stanciliff. The case involves a great many technical points of law, and particularly includes a very important issue, that of whether or not occupancy and possession of government land over a long period of years can give title.

JURY IN DOG CASE FAILS TO AGREE

LA GRANDE, Ore., March 19.—After spending all night in a hopeless deadlock, the jury in the case of the State vs. Jack Hilary, was dismissed today by Circuit Judge McCulloch, of Baker, who heard the trial. The prosecution announced that Hilary would be placed on trial a second time, probably next fall. Unofficial reports are that the vote of the jury was evenly divided.

The defendant was accused of wanton destruction of personal property by pouring oil on a setter dog, owned by Lewis Wetzel, and then igniting the animal, the burns resulting in its death. Hilary attempted to show the death was the result of an accident.

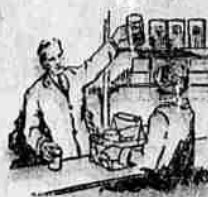
