DAWES PAYS TRIBUTE TO COLONEL COOLIDGE.

WASHINGTON, March 19.—Colonel John C. Coolidge was a personal visitor at the White House today in rendering tribute to the father of the President.

"Even after his son was chosen as the nation's chief," he said, "I imagine that his neighbors at Plymouth more often thought of the President as the son of Colonel Coolidge than they did of Colonel Coolidge as the father of a President."

Senate Adjourns.
WASHINGTON, March 19.—The senate adjourned as soon as it met today on motion of Senator Dale, Republican, Vermont, out of respect to Colonel John C. Coolidge, father of the President.

The house adopted a resolution extending its sympathy to the President.

MONTPELIER, Vt., March 19.—Flags on the Vermont state capitol were at half staff today in honor of the memory of Colonel John C. Coolidge, father of the President.

Military Escort Offered.
WASHINGTON, March 19.—A military escort for the funeral of Colonel John C. Coolidge was offered to the White House today by the War Department, through Assistant Secretary MacNider. The tender was referred to Plymouth.

Should the President decide upon such military representation, a squadron of cavalry from Fort Eben Allen, Vt., would make the journey to the Coolidge homestead. The squadron has been ordered to stand in readiness.
