STANFIELD'S NEW GRAZING BILL IS O. K.'D BY JARDINE

Provision Gives Share of Receipts From Permits for Improvement of Ranges.

WASHINGTON, March 20.—A new bill to regulate and stabilize grazing on national forests was approved today by Secretary Jardine in a letter to Chairman Stanfield of the senate public lands committee. Secretary Jardine said: "I am confident that it fully safeguards the principles of conservation in re-affirming the primary purposes of the national forests with respect to timber production and water shed protection and making the use of their forage resources subordinate to these that this bill will promote stability in the livestock industry and in the west and in the agriculture depend upon it."

A favorable report on the measure by the committee is expected soon.

The secretary said the new bill's provisions under which ten per cent of the receipts from grazing would be available for range improvements in the national forests had been approved in principle by the budget bureau as "in harmony with the fiscal policy of the administration." The bill proclaims a national policy regarding the forests, setting forth that the utilization for grazing should be subordinate to development of mineral resources; protection and development of forests and their waters and their use for farming. All grazing permits in effect will remain in force and additional permits may be granted by the secretary for periods up to ten years. The secretary will make allotments for grazing areas and the grazers will receive the benefit of any increases in the capacity of their allotments. Preference in grazing permits is granted to applicants owning or controlling property or range improvements in the vicinity.

The secretary will fix fees which

will be "moderate" and in the case of drought or other injury to the industry, may grant an extension of time in which the fees may be paid, reduce them or eliminate them entirely.

Provision is made for local boards, selected by the permittees of any forest or forests, to cooperate with the government in regulating grazing. Appeals from decision of forest officers may be taken to these boards and their judgment may be appealed to the secretary.

A favorable report on the measure by the committee is expected soon.

BOLSHEVIK HIGH SCHOOL BODY NOT TO BE EXPELLED

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) ASTORIA, Ore., March 20.—In all probability the Astoria school board will make no direct attempt to expel from the Captain Robert Gray Junior High School members of the Young Workers league, an avowed Communist organization, which has been uncovered there, it was indicated today.

Following the policy outlined yesterday when Paul Siro, 14-year old Communist, was relieved as president of the student body, school officials will not permit members of the Young Workers' league to hold positions of prominence among the students. The school executives believe that the young radicals have a better opportunity to recover themselves in the schools than if forced into idleness and the Bolshevik school, which is said to be conducted by the Parent Communist Society, to overcome the Americanism taught in the schools.

ASTORIA, Ore., March 20.—School authorities said that the case of Paul Siro, 14, former president of student body of Captain Robert Gray Junior high school, who was compelled to resign office because of communistic beliefs, first came to their attention when the lad appeared at a meeting of student body officers wearing a lapel button on which was a picture of Nicolai Lenin. This, he said, was the emblem of the young workers league. Under questioning Siro told the school officials that he believed in communist principles and revolutionary socialism, and declared he had been taught the doctrine by his mother.

CAMPAIGN AGAINST DIGGER SQUIRRELS WILL BE WAGED

It is planned to conduct a more strenuous campaign against the ravages of the digger squirrels than has taken place in the county

for several years. In furtherance of this work the department of biological survey has assigned Mr. J. F. Branson to this county for the month of March and part of April.

The digger squirrels are already making their appearance in most sections of the county, and due to the advanced season the damage done by these pests will undoubtedly prove more serious than usual. In order to combat these pests the county agent's office and the United States bureau of biological survey cooperating have established 26 poison bait stations in the county, at which the poison may now be secured.

These poison bait stations are located at Wilbur, Sutherlin, Oakland, Yoncalla, Drain, Alnau, Elkton, Myrtle Creek, Riddle, Canyonville, Days Creek, Milo, Tiller, Glendale, Cow Creek station, Brockway, Ten Mile, Olalla, Camas Valley, Looking Glass, Melrose, Umpqua, Glide, Dixonville, the Farm Bureau Exchange and the County Agent's office in Roseburg. Lack of concentrated endeavor for several past seasons to exterminate these rodent pests, coupled with the extremely favorable weather conditions for their increase, make it imperative that a special effort be made to exterminate the squirrels in the most approved methods available.

DOWAGER QUEEN OF DENMARK DIES: 74 YEARS OF AGE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) COPENHAGEN, March 20.—Dowager Queen Louise of Denmark, who has been suffering from pneumonia, died today. She was 74. Princess Ingeborg, wife of Prince Charles of Sweden, the oldest daughter of the dowager queen, was expected to arrive from Stockholm by airplane this afternoon. King Haakon of Norway, brother of King Christian of Denmark, and second son of Louise, is due to arrive from Oslo, the Norwegian capital tomorrow. Louise is the widow of King Frederick VIII.

ALLEGED AUTO THIEF CAPTURED BY CITY POLICE

Frank Rummel, aged 18 years, of 1113 E. Martin St., Tacoma, was arrested here last night charged with theft of an automobile. The lad's two companions, reported to be Fred Pearson and Al Ridders, each 18, also of Tacoma, escaped from the police, as did two young women who were passengers in the car.

Rummel was arrested when the police were informed that an attempt was being made by three young men to steal gasoline from a car at the corner of Rice and Stephens streets. Officer Webb hurried to the scene, whereupon the occupants of the car all scattered and ran, the officer chasing and apprehending Rummel.

According to the police the prisoner confessed that the auto was stolen by the trio of young men at Tacoma and that they picked up the two girl bikers near Salem.

As a federal law is involved in transportation of a stolen car from one state to another, the case will be turned over to the government. The stolen car, a Chevrolet touring model, was recovered.
