EX-MELROSE MAN DIES AT MEDFORD

News was received here yesterday of the death, resulting from heart failure, of A. J. Anderson of Medford.

Mr. Anderson lived at Melrose for nineteen years and is well known to residents of this section, all of whom will be grieved to learn of the sudden passing. He was 75 years old and a native of Sweden. He leaves three daughters, Mrs. F. Hagar, of Lathrop, Calif., Mrs. Henry C. Tison, of Drew, Ore., and Miss Clara Anderson, a teacher in the Ashland schools, and a son, A. C. Anderson, of Cloverdale.

Mr. Anderson had made his home at Medford for the past six years. The body will arrive in this city tonight and funeral services will be held from the Melrose church Tuesday at 1:30 with interment in the Melrose cemetery.

REVIVAL CAMPAIGN REACHES CLIMAX

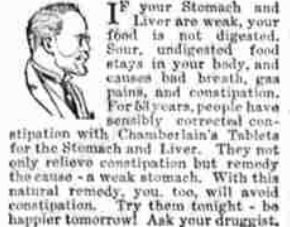
