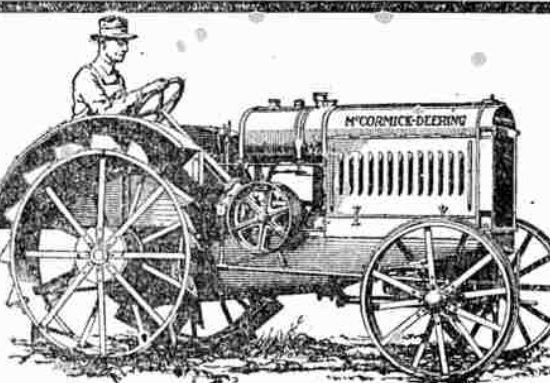

"Cloture" Rule

Cloture did not exist in the British parliament until 1882, debate being unlimited. About 1872 Isaac Butt, leader of the Irish Home Rule party, began the policy, but it was not until 1882 that a "cloture rule" was passed, which allowed the speaker, on request of 40 members, to pronounce the debate closed and call for a vote. In 1902 the present rule was adopted providing that upon the proposal of a question a member might move that the question be put, and if the rules be not abused by such a motion and the rights of the minority be not infringed, the question should be put at once and decided without further debate or amendment.

Fox Changes Color

The blue fox is a color phase of the Arctic, or white, fox, which is circumpolar in range, being found particularly along the seacoasts of Arctic and subarctic regions. Its normal winter coat is white, while the summer pelage is brown and tawny. The blue fox is dark bluish in winter and tends toward brownish in summer. There are intermediate shades of blue and white, or the blue and white may be blended, producing a dingy or smoky-white appearance.

COURT OF LAW NOW BATTLE GROUND OF LIVESTOCK FORCES

SALEM, Ore., March 23.—An echo of the old sheep and cattle war sounded here today when attorneys representing the Big Butte Cattle and Horse Raisers association and others, of Jackson county, appeared before Chief Justice McBride of the supreme court and secured a temporary restraining order inhibiting sheep owners from grazing their sheep on land claimed as cattle range. Defendants in the case are Alex Anderson and others. The range land involved is all unfenced land in the Big Butte country of Jackson county. The petitioners point out that it is a known fact that cattle will not graze and thrive on land where sheep have grazed. They base their case on an Oregon law prohibiting the grazing of sheep on cattle range.

WOMAN ENTERS MOVIE FIELD AS PRODUCER

HOLLYWOOD, Cal., March 23.—(A. P.)—Marion Fairfax, in home life Mrs. Tully Marshall, is invading the last purely masculine stamping ground of the motion picture field—that of independent production.

FARMER AND HIS WIFE FOUND DEAD

KALISPELL, Mont., March 23.—The bodies of Mr. and Mrs. Claude Edwards were found in bed in their farm home near here early today.

Police are of the belief that the case is one of murder and suicide. The bodies were found by a little daughter who notified neighbors.
