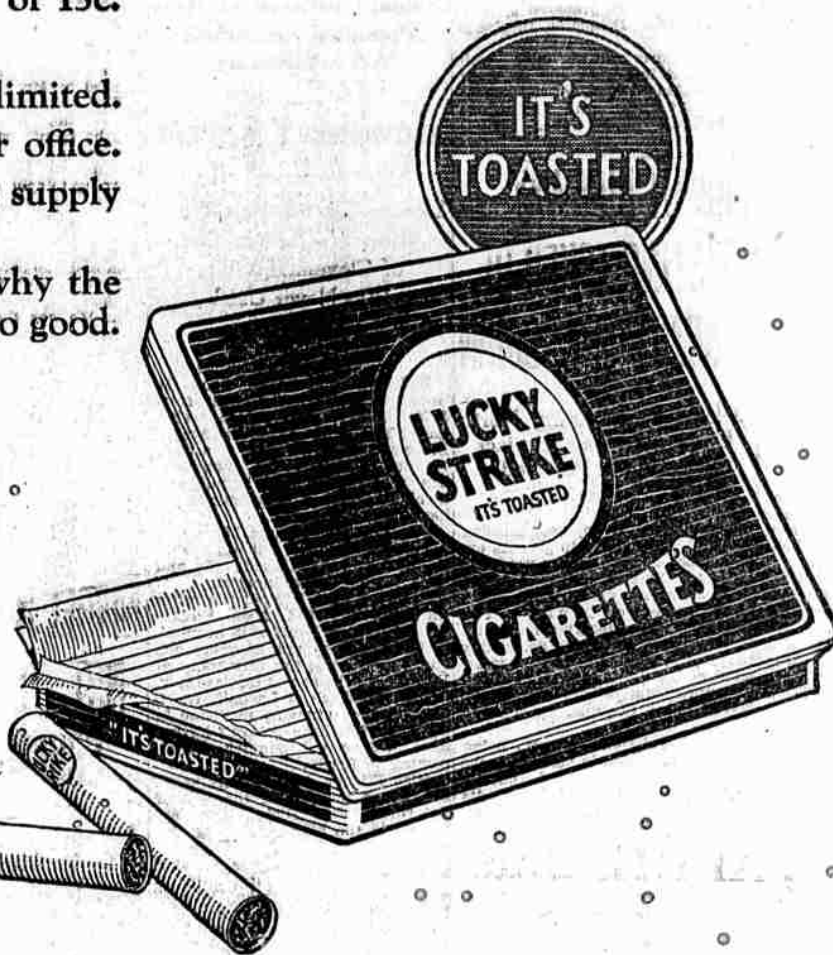

THE ADVANTAGES OF TRACTOR POWER

The advantage of tractor power on the farm, not only in lessening labor but in reducing farming costs, will be demonstrated for farmers of this city on Saturday, March 27, which has been designated as Fordson Day.

The demonstration, which is to be held at Winston will begin at 10 o'clock and all arrangements are being completed by C. A. Lockwood Motor company, local Ford dealers, in co-operation with distributors of equipment adapted to Fordson Tractor power. Farmers generally are invited.

ARMY SEEKING FUNDS FOR HUGE BUILDING PROGRAM

Permanent Quarters for Officers and Men Proposed in Bill Now Presented to Congress.

WASHINGTON, March 25.—An outline of \$110,000,000 will be asked of Congress to house the officers and men of the Army in permanent quarters.

At present only five per cent of the Air Service personnel is satisfactorily sheltered and the remaining ninety-five per cent, together with thousands of commissioned and enlisted personnel in the Infantry, Artillery, Cavalry and other branches, occupy temporary shacks.

Existing conditions will not be entirely remedied until at least ten or more years have passed. Meanwhile the War Department will do what it can in the way of bringing about their gradual betterment. Beginning is provided for in legislation now pending.

At least \$20,000,000 and possibly \$40,000,000 of the needed \$110,000,000 will be raised from sale of properties that have been declared surplus, and this money will be put as rapidly as possible into the permanent quarters construction project.

When the revenue from the sales program is expended, however, progress from then on will depend upon those in charge of the Government's purse strings.

The building program planned by the War Department calls for a total expenditure of about \$1,200,000 for permanent quarters for use of troops in the First Corps Area, comprising the states of Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Massachusetts, Connecticut and Rhode Island. Improvements to be made at Camp Devens, Mass., would cost \$4,450,000 under existing estimates while new construction for the proposed air depot at Boston would cost \$643,500.

In the second corps area—New York, Delaware and New Jersey—the program contemplates an expenditure of \$7,537,000. Chief among the projects planned in this area are improvements for Camp Dix totalling \$1,029,000; Fort Jay, Governors Island, N. Y., \$1,110,000; Mitchell Field, Long Island, \$1,118,000; Plattsburg Barracks, \$445,000; Raritan Arsenal, \$301,500; Fort

Monmouth, \$1,841,000; Fort Wadsworth, \$977,000 and Fort Dupont, \$104,000.

New construction in the third corps area—Maryland, Pennsylvania, Virginia and the District of Columbia—is estimated at \$18,055,000. About \$256,000 would be expended at Aberdeen; \$665,000 at Bolling Field; \$337,000 at Carlisle Barracks; \$188,000 at Edgewood Arsenal; \$2,511,000 at Langley field; \$5,559,000 at Camp Meade; \$2,020,000 at Walter Reed General Hospital and \$2,430,000 at Fort Eustis.

For the fourth corps area—North and South Carolina, Alabama, Florida, Tennessee, Georgia, Mississippi and Louisiana—a total of \$17,078,000 is calculated. The bulk of this amount would go to new construction at Fort Benning estimated at \$10,235,000; \$3,485,000 to Fort Grainger; \$2,159,000 to Camp McClellan, provided Congressional authority is allowed for the War Department to sell the Fort Screven reservation; \$444,000 for Maxwell Field and \$536,000 for Fort McPherson.

The fifth corps area—West Virginia, Ohio, Kentucky and Indiana—would be allowed improved quarters at an aggregate cost of \$2,568,000. This amount would include \$1,946,000 for Fort Benjamin Harrison and \$55,000 for Fort Thomas with a third allotment, not yet finally determined, for work at Columbus Barracks.

Army posts in the Sixth Corps area—Illinois, Wisconsin, Missouri and Michigan—would get a total of \$7,791,500. Chauteau Field improvements would be in the vicinity of \$2,662,000; Jefferson Barracks, \$197,000; Scott Field, \$1,924,500; Selfridge Field, \$2,482,000 and Fort Sheridan, \$50,000.

The seventh corps area—North and South Dakota, Minnesota, Iowa, Missouri, Arkansas, Kansas and Nebraska—would receive about \$1,569,000 of which the main expenditures would be \$1,011,000 for Fort Riley and \$327,000 for Fort Crook.

More than \$18,000,000 would be allotted to the eighth corps area—Texas, New Mexico, Arizona, Colorado and Oklahoma. Fort Bliss would get approximately \$1,159,000; Brown Field, \$2,188,000; Fort Sam Houston, \$8,017,500; Kelley Field, \$1,958,000 and Fort Bliss, \$1,025,000.

The ninth corps area—California, Nevada, Utah, Wyoming, Montana, Idaho, Washington and Oregon—would receive a total of \$6,347,000 to be divided so as to allow \$1,115,000 for the Letterman General Hospital, Presidio; \$4,515,000 for Camp Lewis; \$200,000 for the Monterey Presidio and \$280,000 for Fort McDowell, and the remainder for lesser important projects. No improvements of Alaskan posts which come under the ninth corps headquarters for administration purposes is contemplated in the

JOE LEITER SHOWN INEPT AS MANAGER SUGAR BEET FARM

CHICAGO, March 25.—Further evidence intended to substantiate the charge of gross mismanagement of Wyoming ranching properties was heard today in the suit brought by the Countess of Suffolk and Berks to force removal of her brother, Joseph Leiter, as a co-trustee of the vast estate of their father, Levi Leiter.

W. E. Baker, of Sheridan, Wyo., manager of a beet sugar factory, testified that for several years the Leiter estate tenants were paid the same price as was paid others for sugar beets, but that in 1923 a separate contract was made with the Leiter estate under which it was paid \$7.55 a ton as against \$9.00 to others, and in 1923 the Leiter estate got \$6.07 a ton, while others got \$8.93.

The estate found that the income was not sufficient to meet "fixed charges" of \$15 an acre, and offered to lease 1,000 or more acres to Baker's Corporation at \$25 an acre, more than double the rental of other ground nearby.

PINCHOT BACKED BY MINE WORKERS

HARRISBURG, Pa., March 25.—The United Mine Workers and their friends are determined to elect Governor Pinchot to the United States senate and defeat Senator George Wharton Pepper and Congressman William S. Vare, the governor's opponents in the three-cornered race.

NEW YORK, March 25.—Young Stribling of Atlanta and Jimmy Slattery of Buffalo, N. Y., are at the cross roads of heavyweight pugilism and tonight will choose which will make use of the one which cannot go straight on alone by side.

These youthful performers burst into the boxing foreground about three years ago in much the same way and their careers are linked. The Georgian faced the then light heavyweight champion, Mike McHugh, in a no-decision contest, only to have Slattery to pop from nowhere to beat Stribling in a six-round bout at Buffalo.

Since then both have gained their majority and may engage in bouts of more than six rounds, to which they were limited in New York state while minors. Tonight's squabble is set for ten, but there are many who believe that the battle will end long before the limit is reached. Each man has his following.
