RAT EXTERMINATION CAMPAIGN TO BE STARTED IN CITY

Ira N. Gabrielson, leader of the rodent control with the U. S. Biological Survey, will be in Roseburg on April 6 for the purpose of staging a demonstration in extermination of rats. His department of the biological survey is endeavoring to interest merchants all over the country in exterminating rats. In the cities, particularly the large cities, rats cause thousands upon thousands of dollars worth of loss every year in the basements and storage rooms, where merchandise is kept. It is hoped that the campaign waged will result in a general extermination of the pests. A public demonstration will be arranged in Roseburg for April 6. Merchants and other persons interested may obtain full information concerning the work from County Agent Cooney, who is in charge of local arrangements.

Hawley, of Salem, filed as a candidate for re-election to congress from the third district. W. C. North, of Portland, filed his candidacy for the Republican nomination for representative from Multnomah county. A. M. Collier, Klamath Falls, filed as a candidate for the Republican nomination for representative from Klamath, Crook, Deschutes, Jefferson and Lake counties. C. A. Tom, of R. B. filed his candidacy for the Republican nomination for representative from Sherman, Wheeler and Gilliam counties.

PLANS FOR MUSIC CONVENTION ARE PROGRESSING

Plans are rapidly progressing for the annual state convention of the Music Teachers' Association, which is to be held here May 28, and 29, and a number of matters pertaining to the convention program were taken up at the regular monthly meeting held today at the home of Mrs. C. S. Heinline.

Miss Lucille Sappington, corresponding secretary of the association, gave information at the meeting in regard to national music week which this year occurs May 2 to 10. A letter from the secretary of the national music week committee from New York City was read to the association. A reply from the Roseburg Women's Club to the circular letter sent out by the association to the different clubs and booster organizations of the city, reminding each of the work that was promised to aid the association in the coming convention plan, was received last week and read to the members. The club has voted to give a garden party and luncheon if the latter can conveniently be arranged, on one of the convention dates. For the benefit of those who were unable to be present at last month's meeting, the tentative program for the convention was read.

The association is now making plans for national music week and samples of advertising circulars, which will be used for that week, were displayed. Mrs. Fred Strang, president, appointed Mrs. Charles Brand, chairman of a committee to select matter for the association to use for that week, with Miss Herdner and Miss Dorothy Winston to assist her. Mrs. C. S. Heinline, who was one of the members devoting a great deal of time to last year's program for music week, gave an outline of the program followed. Mrs. C. G. Stanton was appointed chairman, with Mrs. A. J. Young and C. H. Arundel, to make a list of the organizations of Roseburg and outline a plan that the association will carry out for the observance of Music Week. This date being that set aside by the constitution for the appointing of a nominating committee, the president appointed Mrs. L. B. Moore, Mrs. C. S. Heinline and Walter Germain to meet and nominate officers for the current year. Mrs. C. S. Heinline and Mrs. Charles Brand were appointed to list the names of Roseburg of those who would be willing to extend their home towards the convention and entertain one or two delegates. Definite plans for the convention program will be followed at the next monthly meeting.

KLAMATH RANCHER BUYS PLACE ON RICE CREEK FOR HOME

Fred A. Thornton, a resident of Klamath Agency, is moving to Douglas county, having acquired a 100-acre stock ranch on Rice Creek. Mr. Thornton has been investigating the Douglas County property for some time, and has been desirous of acquiring a suitable location. He has purchased the 100-acre tract formerly belonging to E. F. Lang, now a resident of Los Angeles. The place is well situated for stock raising and general farming and has some acres under cultivation. Mr. Thornton expects to move with his family to the new home at once, and will completely stock and equip the ranch and will improve the buildings. He has made plans to log off the timber and devote the cleared land to the raising of stock. The deal was negotiated by the McLendon Real Estate Company.

ROLLING LOG KILLS JOSEPHINE CO. MAN

MINORITY HOLDS STECK ELECTED BY UNFAIR METHODS

WASHINGTON, March 29.—Disregard of the Iowa law and "arbitrary and unfair" methods were charged to the majority of the senate elections committee in the Steck-Brookhart election contest by Senator Stephens, democrat, Mississippi, in a minority report, filed today with the senate. The majority report, holding that Steck was elected and that Brookhart should be unseated, was filed later by Senator Caraway, democrat, Arkansas, on behalf of himself and nine other members of the



This report held that Steck had received a plurality of 1420.

UMPQUA POST NOW THIRD IN STATE IN MEMBERSHIP

Umpqua Post of the American Legion has now reached a total membership of 423, and holds third place in the state. The membership this year is the largest that the post has ever had, being an increase over last year of more than 40 members. Applications are still coming in. Showing that the year is to be a banner one, so far as the American Legion is concerned. The fact that the national commander is to visit the state is stimulating membership activities. Commander McQuigg will be in Portland on April 3, and will visit in Roseburg for a few minutes on April 4.

FREEZING WEATHER NIPS FRUIT IN UTAH

EIGHT PORTLAND UNIONS SEEKING INCREASED WAGES

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
PORTLAND, Ore., March 29.—Streetcar Men Union of Portland is seeking an increase in wages for platform men from 62 to 72 cents an hour, with corresponding increases for shop men and employees of other departments. Other unions also are seeking higher pay. The Painters' Union wants an increase from \$8 to \$9 a day effective April 1. The Bridge and Structural Iron Workers' Union asks an increase from \$8 to \$9 a day on general work and from \$9 to \$10 on structural work. The plumbers are after a boost to \$11 a day from \$10. The glaziers want their wages raised from \$28 to \$30. The hoisting and portable engineers would like \$10 instead of \$9 a day. The carpenters wages went to \$9 a day February 15. The Electric Workers Union obtained a pay boost of \$1, making the scale \$10 a day March 1.

GOVERNOR'S MANSION IS NOT LIKE "HOME" TO NELLIE ROSS
CHEYENNE, March 29.—The gubernatorial mansion of Wyoming is not like "home" to Gov. Nellie Ross.

Mrs. Ross has lived three years in the mansion provided by Wyoming for its state executives, two of them while her husband was governor and for the last year as his elected successor.

Despite the mansion's magnificence, Mrs. Ross says "it is not like home."

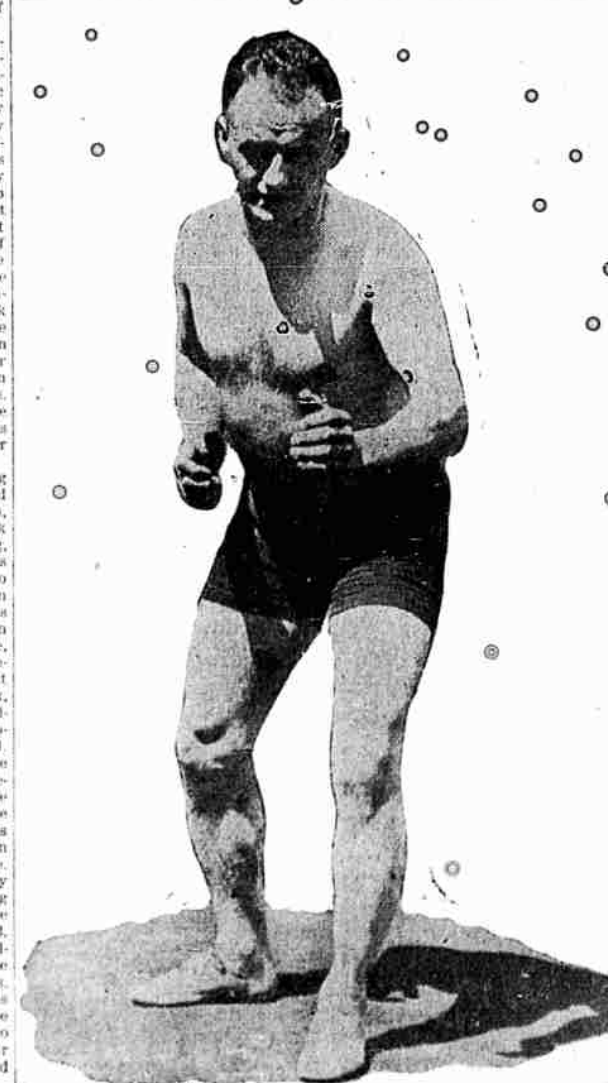
