## LUTHER BURBANK FIGHTS FOR LIFE IN HIS 77TH YEAR

Condition of Plant Wizard After Heart Attack Is Called "Doubtful" by Physician.

(Associated Press Pressed Wire.) SANTA ROSA, Cal., March 30.—Luther Burbank, world famed horticulturist, is waging a valiant battle against a persistent illness which has confined him to bed at his home here for the last few days.

Extreme nervousness of the patient and a seemingly constant desire to return to his work in the garden, combined to make his condition "doubtful" last night, his personal physician, Dr. Joseph H. Shaw said.

Dr. Shaw this morning said Mr. Burbank was resting fairly comfortably with short periods of refreshing sleep, more or less disturbed by occasional hiccuping.

"Owing to his extreme age and intense nervousness, his condition is doubtful," Dr. Shaw added.

This statement was taken to mean that the length of time for Mr. Burbank's recovery was uncertain.

His temperature last night was given as 99, pulse 104 and respiration 18. Dr. Shaw said Mr. Burbank was suffering no pain. Two nurses were in attendance at his bedside. Mr. Burbank is 77 years old.

The plant wizard has recently received numerous communications commenting on his recent statement that he was an "infidel" and he attempted to give these his attention.

Mr. Burbank was seized with a heart attack last Thursday night and has been confined to bed since.

## SAYS FRANCE CAN'T PAY WAR DEBT IF GERMANY DOESN'T

(Associated Press Pressed Wire.) PARIS, March 30.—France can make no settlement of the inter-allied debts that is not based in some measure on reparation payments from Germany. Finance Minister Porel declared in his speech opening the debate on the financial measures in the Chamber of Deputies today.

The terms, he added, should include a safeguarding clause that would give France protection should Germany at any time default.

BOGOTA, Colombia, March 30.—A person is known to have been killed and 20 injured in the collision last night of an express train bound from Bogota for Girardot and the coast and a freight train. ## SISTER OF KING GEORGE VERY ILL OF BRONCHITIS

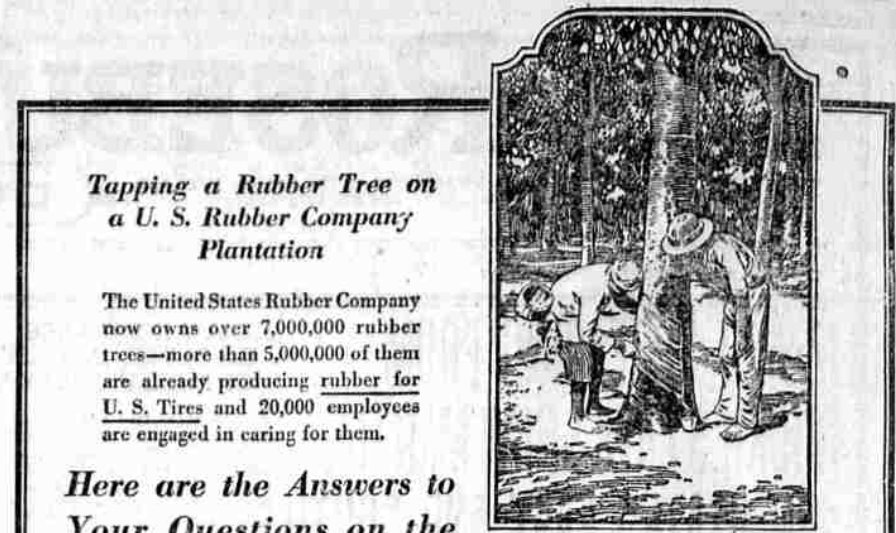
