REPUBLICAN CONVENTION FLAYS HARD

(Continued from page 1)

other executive organization of taxpayers." On the subject of prohibition, the platform declares "there is no real issue before the people as to the modification of the prohibition laws of this state, we believe the real issue to be law and order." More effective enforcement of liquor law is urged, and promised.

Tax Relief Demanded.

A more just equalization of taxes, without additional laws, rigid economy in the conduct of governmental business, and the minimum of public officials is favored as a remedy for taxation. Simplification of the present tax laws, is also urged. The recommendation of the state assessors' association that the state tax commission be given power to supervise and harmonize assessments and the taxation of intangibles, is approved.

The recovery of taxes on Oregon-California land grant lands, as proposed by Senator Stanfield's bill in congress, is endorsed.

Against Tithing Bill.

Conservation and protection of wild game and fish is urged, and the Jackson county delegation to the legislature "instructed to support such measures as will make it impossible for any future governor to build a political machine out of the great game organization of our state," and the game commission funds be spent exclusively for game protection and conservation.

The voters are implored to vote against the "tithing bill," which has for its purpose the diversion of ten per cent of the game funds into the general fund.

The administration of President Coolidge is commended, and county officials of Jackson county are complimented for the enforcement of the law, at a reduction in cost.

The preamble to the platform sets forth that the object of the convention is to "destroy minority dictation," restore "party solidarity," and "to make the primary system strong where it is now weak."

A resolution favoring Representative John H. Carlin of this county for speaker of the house at the next session of the legislature was adopted.

Speedy Action Not Liked.

Before the final adoption of the platform a flurry was caused by W. M. Carle, Foothills Creek delegate, who objected to its quick passage, and when called upon to name the objectionable portions, said he doubted the wisdom of stating the number of pardons and paroles granted by Governor Pierce.

The secretary produced a document to show that the figures had been procured from the prison book. "That's all right," replied Mr. Carle. "I was told it was only five."

C. E. Gates, of Medford said: "It is evident that the governor kept on your shoulder, and you believed it," which caused the delegates to cheer.

Mr. Carle also wanted to amend a portion of the platform reading "with reverence for law," to include the words, "and God."

The motion was killed when the secretary stated that "it would mean altering the words of Abraham Lincoln."

A few of the rural delegates protested against the speedy adoption of the platform and one woman delegate argued that "whatever the result of the primary, rural women would vote for what they thought best for their children, their home and their country, in the fall."

When the platform finally came to a vote at noon, it was adopted without a dissenting voice.

Medford, Ore., March 29.—Republicans of Jackson county, with delegates from every one of the 56 precincts present, met this morning for their first pre-primary convention for the endorsement of candidates for the county offices, and the adoption of a party platform. No endorsement for national or state offices will be made.

The chairmanship will be given, in all probability, to John J. Buchter, a Spanish war veteran of this city, unless a dark horse should develop at the eleventh hour.

Three After Dennis' Seat.

LA GRANDE, Ore., March 29.—A. T. Hill, president of the La Grande city commission, has decided to seek the Republican nomination for Union-Wallowa county state senator, bringing the total of announced candidates for the seat Bruce Dennis vacated to three. The other two are Representative A. H. Hunter, Democrat, and R. J. Green, La Grande attorney, Republican.

ATTORNEY BARRED FROM P. O. BUREAU FOR PROPAGANDA

WASHINGTON, March 29.—The joint congressional postal committee set a precedent today by closing its doors forever to Richard H. Lee of New York, attorney for the National Council of Business Mail Users.

The action was taken by unanimous vote after committee members had read a letter sent out by Lee urging a campaign of letter writing to senators and representatives in the interest of lower postal rates, and declaring that Chairman Moskos of the committee "intends to do nothing or something too late for action at this session of congress."

The chairman also was accused of being "unfair and dilatory." Committee members said the resolution barring the lawyer from ever appearing before it again was in the nature of a punishment for contempt, and was unique in congressional history.
