TARIFF PROBERS STRIKE SNAG AND ISSUE SUBPOENA

WASHINGTON, March 30.—A subpoena was resorted to today by the senate tariff investigating committee in its effort to secure confidential reports of the tariff commission.

The subpoena was issued after Chairman Marvin had declined to disclose the vote on the commission's lined oil inquiry on the ground that it was a confidential report to the President.

The secretary was directed to deliver to the senate committee all of the commission's reports not heretofore made public, and the copy of a letter Chairman Marvin wrote President Coolidge asking permission to publish the sugar report.

"Under what section of the law do you withhold the reports from this committee?" asked Senator Robinson.

"I recall no provision of the law, but the commission is regarded as an adviser to the President and is a question of who has jurisdiction," replied Chairman Marvin.

"All members of the commission think all the reports should be made public, when the case is disposed of. I personally wrote to President Coolidge for permission to publish the sugar report, but my letter has not been answered."

MACADAM ROADS IN OREGON TO BE GIVEN OIL COATS

SALEM, Ore., March 30.—The State Highway Commission has announced that oiling operations on a number of the macadam highways in eastern Oregon will be under way in the near future. One oiling crew will begin near Arlington about April 4, and similar operations will start at Bend and Pendleton on April 15, and at Huntington about May 1.

They plan to oil the following sections of highway as rapidly as possible:

The Old Oregon Trail complete from The Dalles to the Idaho state line; those sections of The Dalles-Columbia highway from The Dalles to Dufur; the Jefferson county line to Bend, and from Lava Butte to Lapine; the Sherman highway from Higgs to Waco; the McKenzie Highway from Redmond to Prineville.

In eastern Oregon, in addition to the Old Oregon Trail, it is planned to oil the La Grande-Wallowa Lake Highway between La Grande and Elgin, and a short section of
