EUGENE RESIDENT KILLED OPERATING A WOOD SAW

EUGENE, Ore., April 1.—Henry Sarbacher, 43, resident of Eugene for many years, was accidentally killed this morning while operating a wood saw at a local wood yard. Sarbacher and his assistants were sawing wood from a high tier of rough fire wood. Foundation of the tier weakened, and Sarbacher fell with the wood. He was thrown into the teeth of the whirling saw and his head was split open. Sarbacher is survived by his widow, two daughters and a son, all of Eugene.

Barbarous Passion Play of Yaqui Penitentes To Edify Tourist Host In Southwest

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) DENVER, Col., April 1.—The near approach of Easter will be ushered into the southwest tonight by the throbbing of Indian tom-toms along the southern border of Arizona and the wail of reed flutes of the penitentes in the remote hill regions of New Mexico.

Following preparations which have been under way for weeks and preliminary rites veiled in mystery, the red men of the desert country and the descendants of the Spanish conquerors in the foothills will begin their annual enactment of versions of the Passion Play and the crucifixion.

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CLARENCE E. EVEY'S SLOGAN POPULAR RULE—JUDGE RAMSEY AND GEORGE DUNN FILE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) SALEM, Ore., April 1.—Another candidate for United States senator appeared on the political stage today when Clarence E. Evey of Mountaineer, Washington county, filed with the secretary of state his declaration as a candidate for the Republican nomination. In his statement of principles he promises to "help the people of Oregon to continue to indicate by majority vote, and to control directly within the state all such questions as taxation, prohibition, schools and all questions which, on the face of them, should be decided by the people of this state—all questions pertaining exclusively to the public interest."

Cargo of Cartridges Destined for Mexico on Steamer Seized at New York and Three of Crew Arrested

NEW YORK, April 1.—Charged with violation of the President's proclamation forbidding the exportation of arms and ammunition from the United States to Mexico, three members of the crew of the Ward line freighter Canto were held under arrest today. Their arrest followed discovery of 20,000 cartridges secreted on the ship.

RE-TRIAL ORDERED IN DAMAGE ACTION

W. C. WINSTON PASSES AWAY IN 87TH YEAR

William Chaney Winston, one of Douglas county's best known men, died quite suddenly about 3 o'clock this morning. Mr. Winston, who was nearly 88 years of age, had been ailing in health for several months, and his condition became worse about two weeks ago. However, for the past few days he had apparently improved in health, being able to get about better without suffering so much from rheumatism, which had caused him much suffering.

JASPER WAITE, FORMER ROSEBURG RESIDENT, IS DEAD

Word was received here late yesterday evening of the death in Portland of Jasper B. Waite, for many years a resident of Roseburg. Jasper Waite was a member of one of Douglas county's best known and most prominent pioneer families. He was employed for many years by the Southern Pacific company as an engineer running out of Roseburg for a long period of time prior to moving to Portland where he has made his home in recent years.

KLAMATH FALLS GROWS FAST
