MANY MOVIE ACTORS MAKE RAPID ASCENT

Jump From Poverty to Riches in Few Years in Picture Industry.

RISE IS RAPID

Many Leaders in Screen Life Began Life in Humble Circumstances—Paid Huge Sums.

HOLLYWOOD, Cal., April 1.—(A. P.)—Shiny serge suits have been supplanted by arrays of English-tailored garments. Fluffy fur imitations have given way to silks. Instead of hall bedrooms, there are fine homes. Trips to Europe, once confined to dreams, now receive no more thought than visits to Florida.

Such has been life to many of the movie stars who began in the age of one-reel thrillers, when five dollars a day was considered a fat salary.

To the millions that throng the picture houses, this might seem as if a fairy had waved her wand. But to the players the change has been written in weeks, months and years of toil, repaid by rapid progress of a new industry.

After a career on the stage, which began at the age of five and led to Belasco productions, Mary Pickford entered motion pictures as a extra under David Wark Griffith. From five dollars a day, she advanced until in 1916, the Mary Pickford Film Corporation was organized. The star had a drawing account of \$10,000 a week, with fifty per cent of the profits, a remuneration representing the highest amount ever paid a woman in pictures or any other profession at the time.

Today, she is one of the leading figures in the United Artists Corporation and is receiving a much larger income.

The other member of the family, Douglas Fairbanks, however, has never known a poor salary in the movies. He came in at a time when producers were offering high pay to induce stage stars to appear on the screen. This little era was marked by the fact that Fairbanks and William S. Hart were among the very few to remain with pictures.

Shortly after Miss Pickford went with Griffith, the Gish girls, Dorothy and Lillian, joined the director as extras. Lillian's fame came in "The Birth of a Nation." Her latest vehicle was "La Boheme." Dorothy also starred in several of Griffith's special productions and her last appearance was in "Nell Gwynn," an English film.

Wallace Beery was an animal trainer and then a baritone singer with a stock company. His first salary with the movies was little more than the twenty dollars he had received as a warbler. Now he owns a home in Hollywood, two mountain cabins, a stable of horses and is a member of twenty six clubs and lodges.

The Marquise de la Falaise de la Coudray, better known as Gloria Swanson, came along a little later as a bathing beauty in short comedies. Soon she may have a company of her own in the United Artists group.

Norma and Constance Talmadge and Dolores Costello were little more than kids when they played bits in the one-reelers which brought John Bunny and Flora Finch to the heights of their fame.

Charlie Chaplin made his screen debut in 1914 and three years later signed a contract to make eight two reel comedies at a salary of \$1,000,000. Today, he is one of the United Artists clan.

Fifteen years ago, Ricardo Cortez was making twenty-two dollars a week in the movies. A hard climb brought him to the top and he now is working in "Sorrows of Satan," which Griffith is making.

A fireman's seat in a railroad engine, coal mines, timber camps and wind-jammed fleets engaged Monte Blue's time before he became a stage hand in a movie. At here, where Griffith gave him a start as an extra, Blue now heads his own production company with Warner Brothers.

Jack Holt was a rancher, civil engineer, miner, sheep raiser and a freighter of government mail in Alaska before he began facing the camera. His progress was replete with hard knocks, but today he manages to own a stable of fine ponies which he uses as a member of the famous Midwest Club polo team.

Lon Chaney remembers a time when the Klieg light had not even been thought of as a possibility. In those days, the whole staff would drive into the country and usually return with one complete episode to a serial.

In addition to his screen work, Chaney at present finds much of his time taken by business interests.

Numerous other stars have followed the industry since the days of its infancy. Virtually all the big producers of the present day—Lasky, the Goldwyns, Laemmle, Fox and several others—have developed companies which had their origin in the first days of the movies.

To the veterans, however, advancement to stardom does not seem as difficult as formerly.

MARCH BIG MONTH IN C. OF C. LAND SETTLEMENT WORK

March was Oregon's month in land settlement activities. An unprecedented volume of inquiries for information on Oregon's agricultural opportunities came to W. G. Ide, of the state and Portland chambers of commerce, including a list of 10,000 names turned over by the northern transcontinental railway lines, the largest number received at one time.

These inquiries came to the railroads in response to their north-west advertising carried in national publications. Each of these 10,000 eastern and middlewestern people as well as the thousands who write directly to the land settlement department, receive a personal letter and package of Oregon literature.

Among those who have recently arrived in Oregon to select farm tracts was Emil Schuler, a civil engineer of Slayton, Minnesota, seeking two or three thousand acres capable of being dyked and drained. Representing a group of men with capital who have been prominent in the development of lands in Iowa and Minnesota by drainage, Mr. Schuler has been directed to various tracts of river bottom land which are suitable for colonization purposes. He is consulting with the soil experts of the Oregon Agricultural college before making final choice for himself and his associates.

A new settler in the Canby district is Miss Julia Clarke who came from Carthage, Missouri, purchasing a tract containing a \$2000 rhubarb crop. A skilled horticulturist graduated from a Pennsylvania college, Miss Clarke expects to specialize in bulbs and poultry on her Clackamas county farm.

In preparation for handling the new prospects, practically all western and central Oregon counties have completed organization of their committees for appraising and listing lands and welcoming new settlers.

HOTEL FIRE FATAL

TO AGED MAN WHO.

BUILT STRUCTURE

REDDING, Cal., April 1.—Charles H. Hamilton, 84, was killed yesterday, when fire destroyed the Frank Gregory Hotel at Antler, a resort on the upper Sacramento River, 32 miles from here. Hamilton built the hotel 20 years ago for Gregory and had lived there since. While others were fighting the flames, Hamilton labored to save some of his property. A few moments later he appeared at a window, calling for help, but fell to the ground and broke a collar bone before a ladder could be raised. His death resulted from his injuries and severe burns. The damage to the hotel was estimated at \$10,000.

BONDS, \$150,000,

SELL AT DISCOUNT

EUGENE, Ore., April 1.—Lumberman's Trust company, Ralph Schneckoek and Ferris and Hardware of Portland, bidding jointly, were awarded the \$150,000 bond issue providing for the construction of the proposed new University of Oregon basketball pavilion, at a meeting of the building committee of the University Board of Regents yesterday. The bonds are to be sold at \$98 per \$1,000, with interest at the rate of six per cent.

Bids for the construction of the pavilion will be opened at the comptroller's office at 11 a. m., April 21.

The regent building group also authorized the construction of four new handball courts in the men's outdoor gymnasium. Grading for a new Freshman baseball diamond was also authorized. The women's athletic field will be completed, it was decided.

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SNOW IN EASTERN

OREGON; FIRES IN

LANE CO. FORESTS

LA GRANDE, Ore., April 1.—Mother Nature played an April fool joke on the Grande Ronde valley early this morning, when she blanketed the county with a two-

inch snow covering, and some of the farmers, busy with plowing and seeding, didn't take it so well. It is believed that little damage, with the exception of delay in spring work, will result. The snow was preceded by a rainstorm accompanied by a brisk wind. With the mercury near 40 degrees above this morning the snow is rapidly disappearing.
