Instructor and Primary Plans. Club work has always been of great interest to Miss Parrott. She was the first president of the Roseburg Business and Professional Women's Club, one of the most active organizations in the city. She is also a member of the Women's Club, the oldest and largest club in Roseburg.

A trip to Europe last summer gives Miss Parrott another enviable source of comparison.

Miss Parrott believes that education is the most important business of the state; she further believes that the children of Oregon deserve the best educationally; and if elected she will endeavor to give them the best.

Miss Parrott will continue the progressive policy of her predecessors

and endeavor to increase the efficiency of the schools without increasing the cost of maintenance.

She holds that the best opportunities educationally is the right of the child—whether in a rural community or in a city—and it is her aim, if elected, to see that that opportunity is given.

An educational program that develops the child mentally, morally, physically, socially and economically, is a reality in some eastern and in a few western schools. To make this rounded program general in Oregon will be her endeavor.

A retirement fund for teachers, textbooks written for Oregon children, and a secretary of education in the president's cabinet, are some of the educational measures that she is especially interested in.
