Color Scheme to Classify Humanity

Master Painter Prophesies Period When Clothing And Buildings Will Distinguish Professions, Trades And Personal Types—Psychological Effect on Different Persons Pointed Out.

CLEVELAND, O., April 1.—If a young lady's steady caller has not proposed marriage, he might try leading him on—into the next room where there is a different color scheme, suggests William Dowdle, Cleveland master painter and decorator.

"Under a different color scheme, he may be inspired to brood the question he has been wanting to ask for a long time," Mr. Dowdle said.

Likewise the mortgage holder who calls for the purpose of fore-

closing may change his mind and postpone the "dreadful day" if he is properly impressed by the color scheme of the mortgagee's living room.

Colors Badges of Trade.

Mr. Dowdle prophesies the day when even the most brilliant colors and the most exquisite pastels will be used in building construction when persons of various trades will be distinguishable by the color of their garb, and when color symphonies will be events comparing in importance with or

chestful symphonies of today. "Color is bound to play a more important role in our American architecture, clothing, ordinary life and entertainment," he said.

Already colors are being used in exterior construction, builders, apparently having taken a tip from the southern climates where colors are used profusely, he continued. "There is no limit to the colors that will be used other than the colors in the spectrum of which there are thousands," he said. "Pigments can be obtained in all shades and tints and they can be readily used in exterior plaster, stucco and tile."

Effects On Human Minds.

"We have already learned to adapt colors to the needs of interiors. We know now that a pink kitchen will make the cook contented, and that the proper combination of a soothing blue and a cheerful yellow will make even mortgage-holder content. The subject and depart thanking his hostess for the enjoyable time he has had."

What Colors Signify.

"Gold signifies glory and power; white, the beginning of things, as in marriage and birth; black, the end, as in death; violet denotes dignity and hence is used by clergy, by people, by the clergy, church and royalty; red is the dynamic color of life, typifying blood and vigor, hence the term 'flaming youth'; rose denotes martyrdom; saffron is the confessor's color; blue is for cold stability."

"The darker the blue, the more stable is the disposition, as seen in the dark blue of the navy uniform. As blue becomes lighter it still belongs to the cold group but is warmer. Hence baby blue is adapted to boy babies who because of their sex are considered more cold and stable than girls but whose possess in the world entitles them to a tinge of warmth."

"Pink, being a shade of red, denotes the life-giving function of the opposite sex and is used for girl babies, the light shade denoting that the full vigor of the sex is not yet developed."

"There are no better colors for a flax than red, white and blue, Mr. Dowdle said, since the red signifies virility and blue stability while the white separates them and makes them more pleasing to the eye."

"Dark-haired women should wear warm colors but a red-headed woman appears best in gray, blue, or green," he commented, "while green cramps the style of a blond."

NOTICE OF GAME AND FISH STREAM AND LAKE CLOSING.

Notice is hereby given that by an order duly and regularly made by the State Game Commission of the State of Oregon on the 11th day of January, 1926, it was found and determined that the supply of trout and game fish of all kinds is being, and will be, injuriously affected by permitting the same to be taken during the period of time beginning on the 15th day of April, 1926, and ending on the 15th day of April, 1926, both dates inclusive, it shall be unlawful for any person to kill, angle for, take or have in possession, any species of trout or other fish of any kind or species from the following described streams and waters of the State of Oregon, to-wit:

BAKER COUNTY—South Fork of Burnt River above the Carlyle ranch on said river, and all tributaries thereof.

BENTON COUNTY—Mays River and all tributaries thereof, except Muddy Creek.

CLACKAMAS COUNTY—Deep Creek and Rock creek. All tributaries of Eagle creek. All tributaries of the North Fork of the Clackamas river. All tributaries of Salmon river. Milk creek and all tributaries, including Canyon creek, closed above the mouth of Canyon creek.

CLATSOP COUNTY—Beeman creek, Volmers creek, Johnson creek, Muddy creek, Malt creek, Kootchie creek and the South Fork of the Necanicum river, and all tributaries thereof, North Fork of the Necanicum river for a distance of one mile above its mouth.

COOS COUNTY—Ferry creek and all tributaries thereof. All tributaries of Middle creek. All tributaries of the East Fork of the North Fork of the Coquille river. All tributaries of the North Fork of the Coquille river, except the East Fork of the North Fork and Middle creek. All tributaries of the Middle Fork of the Coquille river above its junction with the South Fork of said river, except Lower Rock creek. All tributaries of the South Fork of the Coquille river above its junction with the North Fork of said river. All tributaries of the North Fork of the Coos River above its junction with the South Fork of said river. All tributaries of the East Fork of the Coos River above its junction with the West Fork of the North Fork of Coos river.

CROOK COUNTY—Little Summit creek and the mouth of the mouth of Little Summit creek. McKay creek closed above the mouth of Little McKay Creek.

CURRY COUNTY—All the tributaries of Floras creek, Sixes river and Elk river, Willow creek and all tributaries thereof.

DESCHUTES COUNTY—Deschutes river from the impounding dam in the mouth of the Deschutes river, including Quinn creek and Cultus creeks, this portion of the Deschutes river is known as Crane Prairie. That portion of Elk lake lying north of a line extending across said lake from Elk Point, being 750 feet northeast from the quarter section corner of sections 30 and 31, township 21 south, range 13 east, Willamette Meridian; thence running south 26 degrees, west, across said lake to a point on the south shore of said lake, 71 chains north of the quarter corner between sections 30 and 31, township 21 south, range 13 east, Willamette Meridian.

LANE COUNTY—Richie creek, Johnson creek, Trout creek, Driftwood creek, Granite creek, Indian creek, Gate creek, Martin creek, Deer creek, Ennis creek, Quartz creek and Smith river, all tributaries of the McKenzie river. All tributaries of the Yachats river in Lane county. French Pete creek and East Fork creek, tributaries of the South Fork of the McKenzie river. Hill creek, Swift creek, Larson creek, Cool creek, Buck creek, Simpson creek, Big Willow creek, and Coffee Pot creek, all tributaries of the Middle Fork of the Willamette river above Oak Ridge. Big Will creek and tributaries above the National Forest boundary line. Winberry creek and Champion creek. All tributaries of the Coast Fork of the Willamette river, except Row river. All tributaries of Row river, except Mosby creek.

LAYNE COUNTY—Franklin creek, all tributaries of Mosby creek, Layne creek and Frank Bites creek. Mill creek and tributaries above the Booth-Kelly dam at Wendling.

LINCOLN COUNTY—Alsea river for a distance of 1,500 feet below the dam in said river at the Alsea Fish Hatchery. All tributaries of the Slota river, except Rock creek, Schomaker creek and Drift creek. All tributaries of the Alsea river, except Drift creek, Five Rivers and Fall creek. All tributaries of the Yaquina river, except Big Elk creek, Little Elk creek, and Olalla creek, Spencer creek. All tributaries of the Yachats river.

LINN COUNTY—Hackleman creek, Blyden creek, Indian creek, Burnmaster creek, Moose creek, Kanyon creek, Gopany creek, Jordan creek, and Roaring river. Thomas creek and tributaries above its junction with Blyden creek. Crabtree creek from Island Inn to its source and all tributaries thereof.

MARION COUNTY—Little North Fork of the Santiam river. Davis creek, Powers creek and Little Albiqua creek, tributaries of the Albiqua river, Beaver creek and Little Albiqua creek, tributaries of Mill creek. Branch creek and Drift creek, Olalla creek, a tributary of Clackamas river.

MOHAWK COUNTY—Little Butte creek and tributaries, above Lena Postoffice.

TILLAMOOK COUNTY—Big Nestucca river and all tributaries above Jones Falls in said river, except Meadow lake. Cedar creek, Trask river for a distance of 800 feet below the dam at the State Fish Hatchery. Slab creek above the Roosevelt highway and all tributaries of Slab creek. Little Nestucca river above the Coast Highway near Sulphur Springs Hotel, and all tributaries of the Little Nestucca river. Three Rivers above the mouth of Alder creek, and all tributaries of Three Rivers. Tillamook river above the mouth of Simmons creek, and all tributaries of Tillamook river. Kleichs river above the Red Star camp of the Whitney Lumber Company, and all tributaries of the Kleichs river. Miami river above a point two miles east of the Smith Homestead, and all tributaries of the Miami river. Wilson river above McNamara Bridge, and all tributaries except the North Fork and the Little North Fork of the Wilson river. North Fork of the Wilson river closed above the mouth of the West Fork. Little North Fork of Wilson river above Rush Cabin. Trask river above the mouth of the East North Fork of the Trask river, and all tributaries. North Fork of the Trask river above the Bark Shanty, and all tributaries of the North Fork. Hawk creek and all tributaries.

UMATILLA COUNTY—Umatilla river for a distance of 300 feet below the Three Mile Diversion dam in said river. South Fork of the Umatilla river and all tributaries. All tributaries of Meacham creek, including the North and South Forks. North Fork of the Walla Walla river and tributaries. South Fork of the Walla Walla river above the Intake Power Plant on said river for a distance of six miles above said plant. North and South Forks of McKay creek and all tributaries. Butte creek above Rust Bridge. Pearson creek. East Birch creek, from the mouth of Pearson creek to its source. Notice is hereby given that by an order duly and regularly made by the State Game Commission of the State of Oregon, on the 11th day of January, 1926, it was found and determined that the supply of trout and game fish of all kinds is being, and will be, injuriously affected by permitting the same to be taken from any and all streams, lakes and waters of the State of Oregon, except those in Klamath County, during the period of time hereinafter specified, and that it shall be unlawful for any person to take, kill, angle for, or have in pos-

session any trout or other species of game fish from such streams, lakes and waters during the period of time from November 1, 1926, to November 30, 1926, both dates inclusive, except in Klamath County; and further, that all streams, lakes and waters within all of the State of Oregon, be, and are closed, to fishing with hook and line, commonly known as angling, for and during the period of time from November 1, 1926, to November 30, 1926, both dates inclusive, except in Klamath County, State of Oregon, where the open fishing season shall be from April 15, 1926, to November 30, 1926, both dates inclusive.

Radio's Field Constantly Growing

Theatrical Producers, at First Opposed to the Use of Microphones, Now Included in List of Those Employing Them—Publishers and Promoters of Athletics Also Are Broadcasting.

NEW YORK, April 1.—(A. P.)—Within the past sixteen months, Radio, king of Ether, has greatly extended the boundaries of a vast domain into several territories where support once was lacking. Prominent artists have held out the glad hand of welcome and there is a growing use of the microphone by theatrical producers, movie-makers, sport officials and book publishers to arouse public interest in the results of their labor.

It was only in January of last year that John McCormick, tenor, and Lucrezia Bori, prima donna of the Metropolitan Opera Company, sang in Station WEA-F to an invisible audience estimated from 6,000,000 to 8,000,000 persons.
