## RARE BOOK TELLS THE STORY OF FIRST CONTINENTAL HIKE

**CLAREMONT, Cal., April 3.**—A rare volume containing the story of what purports to be the first transcontinental foot journey of a white man in the conquest of North America is the latest addition to the William S. Mason collection of Western Americana in Pomona College library.

The book tells of the adventures of Cabeza de Vaca, Spanish explorer, in journeying through the southern section of the United States between the years 1528 and 1536, and of his explorations in the River Plate countries of South America after his appointment as governor of the region in 1540.

An expedition, of which Vaca was a member, left Spain in 1527 headed for Florida and Louisiana. It was wrecked on the Florida coast. Fifty survivors drifted to the coast of Texas in rudely constructed boats and made shore November 6, 1528. All but fifteen died of disease or starvation and those became slaves of the Indians.

By a stroke of good luck, Vaca staved off threatening death for himself and companions by posing to the Indians as a divine healer, usually being able to cure minor maladies.

After six years, Vaca, with two companions, escaped. They reached the coast of California and turned southward arriving at Mexico City, July 24, 1536.

As a reward for his exploring services Vaca was appointed governor of the provinces of the Rio de la Plata in South America. Here he incurred the jealousy of his compatriots and was sent back to Spain in 1542, remaining in prison six years awaiting trial. Eventually, he was exiled to Africa.

Two separate editions of the first portion of the book are known to be in existence—one in the New York Public Library and the other in the British Museum at London.

The enterprising merchant frequently labels his offerings so as to show the origin, too, one of the largest establishments asserting that "Nothing but the Best Fifth Avenue Tailors in our stock."

Judith O'Grady, of the Bowery, has it "on" her sister, the Colonel's lady of Park Avenue in one very important essential of city life.

Judith has access to many table delicacies which, strangely enough are not found in any but the most exclusive of groceries and delicatessens. The succulent Aubergine and the crisp broccoli are staples among the penny push cart merchants, as are many of the daintily wrapped imported delicacies offered by the noted caterers.

They are made available to Judith through the insistence of the Ghetto for the eatable common "back home."

Sheer stockings in twenty-two new variations of the fashionable tan, flesh and grey themes, are arranged as a Spring hosiery attraction in an exclusive Madison avenue shop window.

There was a serious disturbance at a downtown theatre one recent evening when the actors failed to keep their appointment, and at a hostelry of disfigured reputation police reserves were necessary to clear a path among the "guerrillas."

The shuffling and scuffling of feet which a very careful listener near Chambers street and the Bowery may hear any day now, is not an invading army, but a sure sign of spring. The migratory "Bo" is preparing to shake the dust and grime of New York City from his feet and strike for the open road.

Police and other competent observers note that "Weary Willie" is growing restive, a sure indication that mild, fragrant breezes and bright skies lurk just around the corner. A week or two is expected to see the first "Bo" on his wandering way, and others will follow in quick succession until the missions and "flop houses" are deserted and can clean house after their winter's tenure.

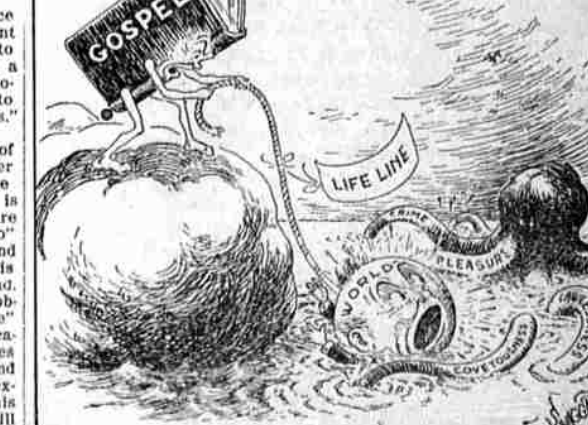
