FREIGHTER UNDER TOW BREAKS LOOSE IN 60-MILE GALE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
CORDOVA, Alaska, April 5.—The Wheatland, which after losing her propeller in the North Pacific Ocean was taken in tow Saturday by the West Nigger, broke away last night in a gale. Both vessels are shipping board freighters.

At noon yesterday the West Nigger was proceeding and drawing the Wheatland after her, the Cuprum which also had hurried to the Wheatland, when her plight was reported Tuesday, having proceeded for Yokohama.

The West Nigger made 108 miles in 24 hours with her tow, despite mist and rough sea.

The wind increased steadily and at 6:15 last night, when the two lines parted, was 60 miles an hour.

No standing by until weather moderated, said a message from the West Nigger, reporting a "very high, rough sea."

The vessels were then 1200 miles southwest of here. The gross registered tonnage of the Nigger is 5445 and that of the Wheatland 7001.

WILD GESE TAKE DEPARTURE FROM GILLIAM COUNTY

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

PORTLAND, Ore., April 5.—Wild geese which had been threatening wheat fields of Gilliam county for several weeks have flown northward.

This information was received today by State Game Warden E. P. Averill, in a letter from Deputy Warden C. W. Loughery of Hood River, who went to Gilliam to help scare the birds away. Loughery said he had looked over the sand bars at Blalock and the islands where the geese roosted and found none. The fields were clear.

The geese instead of flying south last winter remained in Gilliam county, and as spring approached, seemed determined to remain indefinitely. Farmers, fearing the geese would destroy the wheat fields, had applied to the State Game Commission for aid.

"The geese may have gone for only a few weeks," said Averill, "but we are hoping for the best."

DR. THOMPSON OF GRANTS PASS TO BE HEALTH OFFICER

Dr. D. R. Thompson, practicing physician of Grants Pass, has been recommended by the Oregon State Board of Health to take the position of health officer from Douglas county, taking the place made vacant by the resignation of Dr. W. C. Belt, who has tendered his resignation to take effect on May 1. Dr. Thompson is to be in Roseburg tomorrow or Wednesday and will meet with the county court which must approve the appointment before it may become effective.

Dr. Thompson has had a number of years of experience as a practicing physician and has been located in Grants Pass for the past two years. He was in attendance at the recent convention of health officers in the state regarding the public health work in this county.

He will spend a couple of weeks visiting the various parts of the county in company with Dr. Belt before taking over his new duties.

355 NEW MAIL ROUTES.

ROBBERS RAKE IN \$1,000 AT POKER PARTY OF LADIES

CHICAGO, April 5.—Fourteen women playing poker were held up and robbed by three gunmen in a Bronx apartment early this morning. The robbers vanished in an automobile with more than \$1,000 in cash and gems. Children were asleep in a room adjoining that in which two games were in progress.

The robbers gained entrance to the apartment of Mrs. Ida Orr by pretending to be seeking one of the players. The women, true to the traditions of "poker faces," made no outcry and gave up their money and jewelry quietly.

When the robbers discovered the sleeping children they issued their orders in whispers to avoid waking them.

A fourth robber remained outside at the wheel of an automobile while three others held up the women.

SECOND DAY AIR BOMBARDMENT OF PEKING HARMLESS

PEKING, April 5.—Two Manchurian airplanes dropped 12 bombs today near a crowd which had gathered for an Arbor day ceremony. There were no casualties.

It had been announced by the newspapers that Lu Chung-fan, the Kuomintang commissioner in Peking, would be present, but he was unable to attend. The explosion of the bombs created a panic among the crowd.

Today's bombardment from the air, following that of yesterday, is considered as the commencement of a real siege of the capital by the armies of Chang Tso-Lin, the Manchurian war lord, and his powerful ally, Marshal Wu-Pei Fu.

Sunday's bombardment, like that of today, did little damage, but it served to distract the already harassed population.

BULGARIAN MEETS DEATH IN SAWMILL IN THE CASCADES

EUGENE, Ore., April 5.—John Recker, a native of Bulgaria, who had been in the United States for a period of three years, was killed in a sawmill accident at the Potts mill at the summit of the Cascade mountains, Saturday, according to word received here today.

Recker was under the saw table, clearing away sawdust. When he raised his head the saw cut through the skull, from the left eye through the whole side of his head. He died three-quarters of an hour later.

A physician was summoned from Oak Ridge. In making the trip, the physician went to Railroad by train; caught a speeder for a few miles from there, hiked a mile and rode a horse for several miles more. When he arrived, the man was dead.

The body is being sent here. Recker had spoken of a sister in Portland, but her name is not known here.

FIFTY YEARS OF LOVE-MAKING RECALLED BY FAMOUS ACTOR

LONDON, April 5.—(A. P.)—Fifty years of love-making on the English-speaking stage with many of the world's greatest actresses has left Sir Johnston Forbes-Robertson memories of beauty and charm rarely equalled by persons in the theatre.

Ellen Terry, Modjeska, Mary Anderson, Adelaide Neilson, Mrs. Patrick Campbell and Marion Terry are among those who received his stage-worship.

As an oil-stage lover, the famous actor centered all attention upon the beautiful Gertrude Elliott, sister of Maxine Elliott—for whom a New York theatre now is named—and she became his wife.

Modjeska and Ellen Terry are spoken of by Forbes-Robertson in a manner which shows they especially appealed to his fancy.

Modjeska's mastery of six languages and thorough knowledge of the literature of all of them, as well as her rare gifts as an actress, impressed the Romeo of forty years ago. Their performance of Romeo and Juliet in a beautiful garden in Cornwall, he said, was the forerunner of outdoor performances of dramas which have become so popular throughout the world.

He ranked Modjeska in the forefront of the greatest actresses he has seen.

Ellen Terry's youthful beauty entranced the actor.

"That was in the days when open-faced Victorian beauties were in fashion," said Forbes-Robertson. "Miss Terry's beauty was not appreciated by the man in the street. Only artists and sculptors worshipped at her feet."

"As time went on, however, her particular beauty became a sort of vogue, and I once heard Whistler say of her: 'for love of Nell, I'd go to Hell.'"

But in days the actor first mentioned Englishmen loved open-faced women with sloping shoulders and with their hair worn down on both sides of their face, and the average man missed all the beauty of the tall, slender, erect Miss Terry with her great mass of golden red hair arranged in artistic confusion, and her narrow, sensitive face and dreamy eyes.

Forbes-Robertson was only twenty-one when he first acted with Miss Terry and she was five years his senior. She now is seventy-eight and is generally rated as the most beautiful old lady in England.
