the site was selected. Although the library has been in its present location for nearly two years the council has as yet done nothing towards opening the park, but expects to take such action in the near future.

The committee which investigated the remonstrance of Frank Warner regarding the assessment on the Block 53 sewer, reported that it found the assessment equitable, and recommended that the remonstrance be denied. The report was approved and the ordinance levying the assessment for the improvement placed on first and second readings.

The city engineer was ordered to prepare plans and specifications for the construction of a sewer south from the city limits to supply the district just east of the highway and along the extreme south end of the city.

The treasurer was authorized to invest money on hand in sinking funds in city improvement interest warrants.

The recorder was authorized to order manhole rings and covers needed for street work.

Bids for furnishing electrical fixtures and supplies to the city for its street lighting system were referred to the committee on electric lights.

CODY'S FATHER IS TRYING TO SAVE SON FROM NOOSE

PORTLAND, Ore., April 6.—An eleventh hour attempt to save the life of Archie Cody, sentenced to be hanged April 16 for the death of Sheriff Austin Goodman of Harney county, is being made by Barney Cody, of Jacksonville, Ore., father of Archie.

Cody and Mrs. Grace Wick Merrill, formerly of Jacksonville, have been circulating petitions for a reprieve, which they announced they would lay before Governor Walter M. Pierce tomorrow.

The state supreme court recently affirmed the conviction of Cody. Contention that Goodman may have been shot by his gun is the basis of the new effort to save Cody's life. Goodman died from loss of blood from a wound in the leg and is now contended that the fatal bullet was never taken from Goodman's leg to prove that it was the same that was fired by Cody.

Goodman was shot after he had arrested Cody at a ranch in Malheur county August 27, 1924.

The Washington-Oregon-Idaho Air Mail Service is the forerunner of the government's extension program for a contract air mail service of national scope, and a happening of national significance. Starting with 6 airplanes, 4 pilots and 3 mechanics and operated by Walter T. Varney under the first Government air mail contract, it flies daily between Pasco, Washington, Boise, Idaho, and Elko, Nevada, where connection is made with the transcontinental air post at Elko, effecting a 34-hour-by-mail contact between homes, business and banking houses of the Northwest and those of the East. The air mail from the Northwest is carried on fast trains

to Pasco, Washington, where it is assembled and transferred to one of the fast-flying airplanes. The same procedure is followed at Boise. This service effects a great saving in time for mail going to all points East, and also for mail going to all points east and south of Salt Lake City.

Popular Rates

The economy of air post service—soon to be extended to other sections of the Pacific Coast, is shown by the low scale of rates now in effect from the communities of the Northwest; 10c per oz. to Salt Lake City Zone—20c to Chicago Zone—25c to New York Zone.
