HORACE ADDIS IS ELECTED HEAD OF STATE FAIR BOARD

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
SALEM, Ore., April 6.—Horace Addis of Portland was elected president of the Oregon State Fair Board at a meeting of the board held yesterday. Mr. Addis is connected with the Oregon Farmer, Portland publication. He fills a vacancy caused by the resignation of Wayne Stuart, formerly of Albany, but who has moved to Kansas City, Mo. J. E. Reynolds of La Grande was elected vice president.

The board made announcement of prizes aggregating \$495 for the litter contest, for which only \$160 was given last year. The fair board gives \$75, Portland interests \$100 and an eastern concern \$20. A requirement is that the swine litter must weigh in at the state fair and must weigh one ton at the age of 180 days. Litters more than 180 days old will be penalized at the rate of one and two-thirds pounds per pig per day, while one ton litters less than 180 days old will be credited accordingly.

DOLLAR'S BID IS HIGHER OF TWO FOR ORIENTAL VESSELS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
WASHINGTON, April 6.—Bid of \$1,500,000 for the five liners operated out of Seattle by the Admiral-Orion line was submitted to the shipping board today by R. Stanley Dollar.

The figure is an increase of \$1,500,000 over his previous offer. The only other bid received was submitted by W. B. Keene, of New York and Washington, who did not disclose the personnel of the corporation he proposed to organize to operate the ships. His bid was \$4,000,000.

The bids were referred to President Crowley of the Fleet corporation. Chairman O'Connor asked that a report be submitted quickly. Mr. Dollar's bid was a flat proposal to pay \$900,000 for each of the five ships, the President Madison, President Jackson, President McKinley, President Grant and President Jefferson. In his previous bid, which was rejected, he proposed to pay \$600,000 per ship but it was emphasized today by his representatives that modifications in the form of contract made by the shipping board had permitted the higher figure.

WOOL PRICE GOES UP TO 35 CENTS

SALT LAKE CITY, April 6.—Wool buyers stationed here to cover the inter-mountain territory contributed over the week-end the first genuine activity seen in the local wool market this season. It was unofficially estimated that approximately 110,000 fleeces had figured in the three days' transactions. For the most part this represents unshorn 1926 wools and was contracted for at 35 cents, a new high price for the season. Two fleecings in the activity were holdover wools from 1925 and brought 33 cents. One clip from Wyoming in the lot brought 34 cents.

EGYPTIAN GOVERNMENT AIDS 4,000 HOMELESS FROM FIRE

CAIRO, Egypt, April 6.—The Egyptian government has organized relief measures for the 4,000 persons rendered homeless when fire swept the village of Saghat el Kora, six miles from Tantah.

At least thirty five persons perished in the fire, which started at noon Saturday when a sudden change in the wind carried sparks from a household fire, kindled outside the dwelling, to the straw-covered roof.

The government has supplied tents and food for the homeless.

"Village fires in Egypt are generally caused, as in this case, by a change in the wind sending sparks from domestic fires to the highly inflammable roofs."
