ROOMING HOUSE OF BOOTLEGGERS UNDER FEDERAL PADLOCK

PORTLAND, Ore., April 6.—Federal Judge Wolverton today signed a permanent injunction closing for one year from February 15, 1926, the rooming house at number 248 Broad street, Klamath Falls, S. J. Miller, who operated the place, is serving a sixty day jail sentence and is to pay a \$500 fine, having pleaded guilty to liquor law violations. D. W. Burling, his helper, is also serving a sixty-day jail sentence. B. S. Gribble, owner of the property, is named as a party in the abatement suit.

MEDFORD PICNIC PARTY IS LOST IN SISKIYOU REGION

MEDFORD, Ore., April 6.—Guy Connor, local fruit broker, and five children, including his two daughters, are lost in the Siskiyou mountains near Pilot Rock, and up to 1:30 no word had been received as to their whereabouts. John Connor, a son, and John Smith, small boy, returned this morning to the Pacific highway, after becoming separated from the remainder of the party and wandering about the woods all night, and were brought home.

It is thought that the main party became lost after they started a search for the two boys.

Connor took the children on a picnic and left his car parked near the Pacific highway, where it was found by searchers. The lost are, besides Connor, his two daughters, Loyola and Virginia, John Reddy, and two Knopf children.

No great apprehension is felt by friends and relatives for the safety of the party, and up to noon today the authorities had not been notified.

Connor is owner of the Pinnacle Packing company of this city and has relatives in Spokane and Seattle, Washington.

SUICIDES TO GIVE SISTER IN OREGON WHOLE TRUST FUND

BRIDGEPORT, Conn., April 6.—Unsuccessful in his efforts to renounce his interest in a trust fund so that his sister might have full benefit of it for medical treatment, Fred K. A. Boardman, 42, a newspaper reporter, committed suicide, better known among his effects indicated. His body was discovered yesterday at the edge of a pond here. He had shot himself in the forehead with a rifle.

His sister, an inmate of the Oregon State hospital, and he had benefited jointly in a trust fund established by their family. Recently Boardman had written the trust company which held the fund, waiving his interest in it. The reply was to the effect that the company would have to allot him his portion of the fund.

Boardman had worked for newspapers in Honolulu, St. Paul, Baltimore and Philadelphia.

REPUBLICAN PARTY RECORD CHALLENGE TO ALL, FESS AVERS

PORTLAND, Maine, April 6.—When the record of government financing and foreign relations advanced during the last five years of republican administration is made up, it will challenge all administrations of all countries for an equal showing, Senator Fess, Ohio, declared today in a keynote address at the Maine state republican convention.

"We are now eight years from the close of the war," he said. "The republican party has been in charge from March 4, 1921. The contrast between conditions in 1921 and 1926 is striking."

"Capital is fully employed and labor fully and profitably employed. Today there are more home owners among the laboring classes of the United States by three and one-half times than all the home owners of all classes, rich and poor, in Great Britain, the next greatest country on earth."

"There is deposited in the savings institutions more money by seven times over than the capital of a national banks, state banks and trust companies in the entire nation."

SANTA ANA, Cal., April 6.—Flood waters of Santiago creek tore several pilings from beneath the Santa Fe railroad bridge on the San Diego line south of here two minutes after a southbound passenger train had crossed it at 2:20 o'clock this morning.

The bridge was weakened to such an extent that it was closed to further train passage. Workmen expected to have it sufficiently strengthened by this afternoon to permit resumption of traffic.

LONDON, April 6.—(A. P.)—The tilt of Lord Beatty's hat is the right of two persons only in England—the Prince of Wales and Lord Beatty himself.

Lieutenant General Sir William Furse is advising the boys of the Church Lads' Brigade, who are to be inspected by the prince in July, to remember to put their hats straight and keep them straight.
