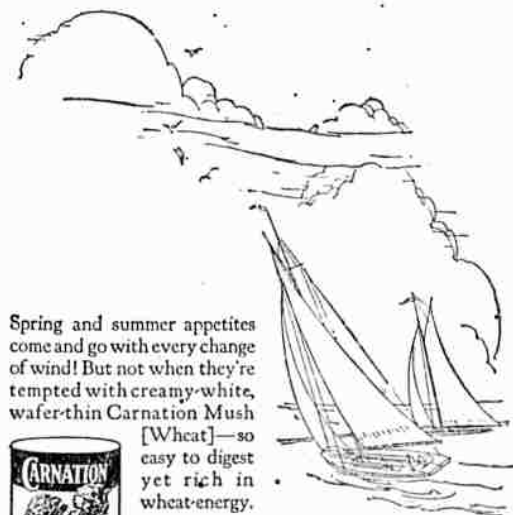

NO LAND SIGHTED
IN RECORD FLIGHT
FROM PT. BARROW

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

NEW YORK, April 7.—Captain George H. Wilkins and his pilot, Ben Ellsen, on March 31 made a flight northward from Point Barrow to latitude 73 degrees and 20 minutes north, without sighting land, the North American Newspaper Alliance announced today. They returned safely.

Vilhjalmur Stefansson, the Arctic explorer, said this meant a flight of seven hundred miles from Fairbanks, Alaska, and seventy miles further than any explorer had previously gone in that direction.

BANK TO AID WOOL
MEN WITH ADVANCE
AT SIX PER CENT

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

SALT LAKE CITY, April 7.—Final arrangements were made today for cooperative marketing of wool from Utah through the Utah Wool Marketing association, a subsidiary of the Utah state wool growers' association, when negotiations were closed with the federal intermediate credit bank to permit growers of the state to obtain advances from 17 to 20 cents a pound at six per cent interest. The bank was represented by W. E. Meyer, assistant manager of the Spokane branch, and the wool marketing association by its directorate of five.

The big accomplishment of cooperative marketing of Utah wool, in the opinion of H. W. Harvey of Heber City, president of the marketing organization and the Utah State Wool Growers' association, is the introduction of a more orderly method of selling.

The association will look toward primary wool markets of the Atlantic seaboard. It has, however, made provisions for storage at Salt Lake City or at Pacific coast points for wools owned by growers who do not care to ship to Boston or other eastern points.

LOCAL CHAMBER
TO JOIN LAND
SETTLEMENT WORK

The directors of the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce met last night in their regular session and considered a number of matters of routine business. The greater part of the evening was spent in a discussion of the matter of the land settlement program. Letters were read showing that a great response is being obtained in this work, over 10,000 inquiries regarding Oregon having been received at headquarters. The local chamber is anxious to get Douglas county well organized in participating in this proposition and a committee of 11 members was authorized to conduct the work. The committee will represent every community and will be organized to interest settlers in the respective localities and to look after any prospective settlers who may be anxious to secure information.

Effective at once Tillamook triplets are quoted at 2c and last 26c f. o. b. Tillamook. Minimum resale prices have been established and were strictly adhered to, by local jobbers.

The resale prices cut the margin of profit for the jobber approximately one-half cent a pound, but at a recent meeting attended by most of the local dealers it was agreed to accept the new schedule and to abide by them, thus eliminating all price cutting in this territory and at the same time establishing a new market.

The new prices on Melwest cheese range one cent below Tillamook, while other Oregon makes not so well advertised, range from two to four cents under Tillamook. Declines at this time are due to the seasonal increase in production and the weakness in the Wisconsin market.

The fresh egg market is weak and lower. On the dairy exchange all grades, but mediums declined one cent. Extras now posted at 25 cents, firsts and mediums 23 cents and current receipts 22c. Receipts yesterday were 877 cases with 14,600 cases shown in local coolers.

Butter remains steady and unchanged with the local market apparently marking time. Receipts of country cubes yesterday amounted to 13,901 pounds with 21,133 pounds manufactured by local creameries.
