CANDIDATE FOR U. S. SENATOR SUBMITS HIS PLATFORM

In a signed statement issued today James J. Crossley, candidate for the republican nomination for United States senator, outlines the principles upon which he is presenting his candidacy to the voters of the state. Declares for the enforcement of the 18th amendment, farm legislation, development of ports and waterways, remuneration to counties for grant land taxes, and other development measures. His platform is as follows:

I am for a vigorous, genuine and effective enforcement of the 18th amendment and all laws for rich and poor alike, without discrimination.

I will work for farmers', wage earners' and veterans' remedial legislation and for the same stabilization of market prices for farm products as for industrial products.

I favor the principles announced in the republican platform for the development of our Merchant Marine and for the fullest development and maintenance of Oregon ports and water ways for vessels of the largest tonnage.

I am for federal reimbursement to counties for tax loss to them by acts of the federal government which have taken property from their tax rolls; and for the completion of the Roosevelt and connecting highways.

I will urge national legislation for cooperation of state and federal governments in the development of Oregon resources, reclamation, irrigation and reforestation.

I am for restricted immigration.

EUGENE, Ore., April 7.—Bill Hayward, University of Oregon track coach, and a squad of 29 cinder artists, will leave at noon today for Palo Alto, California, where the Webfooters will meet the Stanford University stars in a dual meet Saturday.

The Webfooters are crippled by the loss of Joe Price, crack quarter miler. Proctor Flanagan, holder of the broad jump record of the Pacific coast, and Roland Eby, high jumper, are in poor condition, and the whole team is headed southward with the idea of defeat in their minds. Hayward's hope is to have his proteges garner 40 points in the meet.

Two baseball games have been tentatively arranged for this week between the University of Oregon team and the Albany baseball club of the Willamette Valley league. The games, according to present plans, will be played on the Albany lot.

Two other practice games have been scheduled for this month for the Oregon varsity nine. On April 17, the Webfooters will meet the St. Johns Bears of Portland, and on April 23 the Pacific University aggregation will furnish the competition.

Oregon's pitchers are rounding into shape very satisfactorily, according to Coach Billy Reinhart. The outfield and infield competition is rather keen, and the first string has not been selected.
