ADVICE TO HUSBAND COSTS \$500 AND SIX MONTHS' FREEDOM

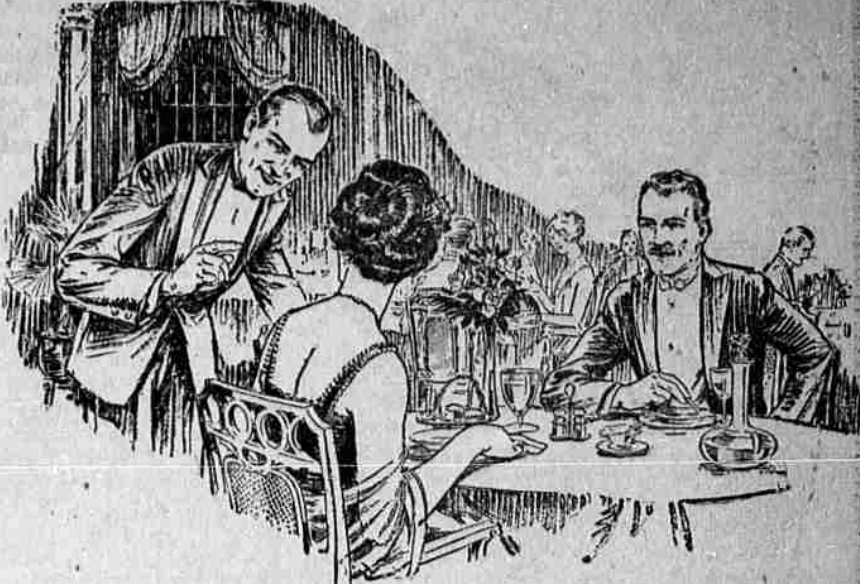

Today the market on country dressed veal is in a demoralized condition. Practically every house along the street has a half dozen or more calves hanging on their hooks, some carried over from yesterday, without any offers.

Good calves this morning were offered at 16 cents and it would take a real fancy veal to bring 14c.

Others are offered as low as 15 cents.

Hogs, too, participate in the break, although receipts are not so liberal and the decline less drastic. Today choice light pork is offered at 18c to 19c with good hogs as low as 17c. The demand, however, is low.

Commission men were busy

into the cooler after the sluggish condition of the market was realized.

Top grade eggs have recovered their previous loss on the dairy exchange and today are again posted at 26 cents. Other grades are steady and unchanged. Yesterday's arrivals were reported at 1753 cases with 15,383 cases in local storage showing 783 cases went into the coolers.

Butter steadily improving, but are well taken care of. Yesterday's receipts reported at 27,051 pounds with 14,931 pounds manufactured by local creameries.

Live poultry is holding in the local market. Receipts were well absorbed and prices fully maintained.
