FARM NEWS

CHERRY GROWERS

Recent state press articles and circular letters have been mailed from various sources to the effect that canneries will refuse to buy any cherries infested with the cherry maggot. This position of the canneries is entirely justifiable as human food is being packed under their supervision and must of necessity be pure and wholesome. Infested cherries have been a source of heavy loss to the canneries the past year by having their product condemned in certain markets.

Naturally the warning has gone out to growers to prevent this infestation by spraying. An efficient spray formula has been developed by the department of entomology of O. A. C., for the destruction of the adult fly. Growers in Douglas county will not need to spray for this fly as a careful field survey conducted by the county agent and horticultural inspector failed to reveal its presence in the orchards.

The time will come, however, when this new pest will call for action. Having this in mind the county extension office will appreciate the cooperation of the orchardists in sending to the office samples of cherries giving evidence of worms.

Every grower has observed at times a small percentage of worms in their fruit, but this worm does no relation to the real cherry maggot as found in orchards of the Willamette valley.

Last year the California state board of horticulture placed a quarantine on shipments of fresh

cherries from a large number of western Oregon counties into that state. Unfortunately Douglas county was included in this quarantine. Steps have been taken by the county agent's office to have this unjust ruling set aside insofar as it applies to this county. If our efforts are successful it will mean the reestablishment of a good market, now closed.

Brown Rot Control of Stone Fruits
Douglas county growers of prunes, apricots and cherries have full knowledge of the annual losses from brown rot and Manilla Blight. Our usual recommendations for the control of these diseases consist of three major sprays of Bordeaux mixture.

These fruits will be ready within a week or ten days for the second spray. The spray to use will be standard Bordeaux 4-4-50 formula. Experience has definitely shown that any particular spray cannot be dropped without endangering the whole crop. The ideal stage of fruit development for this spray will be when the developing fruits are pushing through the flower husk. COUNTRY CLUB ELECTS OFFICERS FOR COMING YEAR

As soon as the indebtedness on the land is paid it is planned to make extensive improvements by providing grass greens and other improvements on the course.

Associate memberships are now being offered, although they are limited to thirty, of which number twelve have already been taken. Associate members have the same advantages as regular members, except that they hold no interest in the property and have no voting privileges. The associate membership fee is \$50 and war tax.

SON OF ASSISTANT NAVY SECRETARY IS OVERSTUDY VICTIM

ROCHESTER, N. Y., April 8.—Douglas Robinson, 21-year-old son of Theodore Douglas Robinson, assistant secretary of the navy, was in a hospital today, having been missing from Harvard University for nearly a week.

The young freshman, whose absence caused his father to make a hurried trip to Washington to Boston, was found lying faced in front of a North Pittsburgh street hotel by a patrolman early this morning. His mind was blank. Believing the youth had been struck by an ambulance, the patrolman summoned an ambulance. At St. Mary's hospital, after some questioning, the youth mumbled what his name was Douglas Robinson and produced his father's personal card.

Hospital physicians said that he was apparently suffering from amnesia and a nervous breakdown brought on by overstudy. There had been a lapse of memory, they said, and the youth was unable to explain his presence in Rochester. The physicians explained, however, that he appeared to be in good physical condition and that his chief worry seemed to be fear of involving his family in undue publicity.

The youth's father at Boston telephoned the hospital and arranged to come to Rochester at once with Mrs. Robinson.

CONSTABULARY IN ALASKA URGED BY CABINET MEMBER

WASHINGTON, April 8.—Complete reorganization of federal government activities in Alaska was recommended by Secretary of Work, Jardine and Hoover today in joint letters to the chairman of the house and senate territories committee.

They submitted a bill which would place all Alaskan activities of the departments of agriculture, interior and commerce under a single administrative head in each case. A federal constabulary for Alaska was suggested and the secretary of the interior would be directed to inquire into its feasibility. The constabulary would take over the enforcement of all federal laws in Alaska.

Gather Every Fifteen Years to Honor Deity

On the great hill of Sravanabelagola, in Mysore state, southern India, stands a colossal image over 60 feet high of the god Konaateswara. Every 15 years a great festival is held in honor of the deity, and hundreds of thousands of Jains come from all parts of India to participate in it.

One of the principal events of the festival is the ceremonial anointing of the image with ghee, milk, sandalwood oil and other liquids. A large scaffolding is erected around the figure to render it accessible and the right to anoint it put up at auction—a curious feature of a religious festival.

The figure of the god is a huge monolith—probably the largest in the world. It was hewn out of solid rock at least a thousand years ago and is in a wonderful state of preservation.—Wide World Magazine.
