CANADA'S DEAL WITH PROBLEM OF LIQUOR TOLD

how do you account for so much liquor coming over the border into my state?" asked Senator Walsh, Democrat, Montana.

"If I wanted to go into that business it could be done," Russell replied. "Say there were five men in a family and five cases are delivered in a week. They could run some of it over the border to get the higher prices. If caught they would go to the penitentiary."

Senator Walsh insisted that the liquor coming from Canada was "the one problem" in enforcement in Montana.

"Well Alberta province may not have adopted the one case a week law," the witness said.

Dry Law Favors Rich.
Matthew Wolf, vice president of the American Federation of Labor, read a statement saying the dry law had brought widespread law violation and was viewed by the workman as a law directed against the poor and in favor of the rich.

"The drunkenness has been replaced by whiskey drinking," he said, "and bootleggers are infesting the halls of labor and other gatherings trying to sell liquor."

The pocket flask may be found in almost every store and is never absent from any meeting, dinner or dance," Wolf said. "Young and old alike do not regard the Volstead law as a sane legislative expression under the Eighteenth amendment but as an impression of fanaticism, clothed in the form of law, which has its counterpart in Mussolinism and Bolshevism. All represent a denial of self government."

The observance of the Volstead law is in its breach and its virtue is in disregard for law. "Morality, sobriety, temperance, respect for and observance of law are best advanced by substitution of sane, temperate legislation, not by ruthless prohibition."

OIL FIRES UNDER CONTROL; LOSS IS OVER 10 MILLIONS

San Luis Obispo Calamity Confined to Reservoir—Groves and Homes Burn at Brea.

LOS ANGELES, April 10.—Still menacing as long as it burns, but steadily becoming less threatening, the fire burning since Thursday morning on the tank farm of the Union Oil company at Brea, 20 miles south of here, seemed early today to have been isolated thus preventing it from adding to the destruction which already will mount into the millions.

While the successful fight was being made against the blaze at Brea the even more destructive fire on the company's huge tank farm at San Luis Obispo had about run its course. Six reservoirs and some 12 or 13 smaller surfaced tanks were nearly burned out as the fire, started by lightning Wednesday, entered on its fourth day.

Revised estimates last night placed the loss of 5,000,000 barrels of oil at \$7,000,000, but left the damage to equipment still undetermined. Of the entire tank farm, only six or seven surface tanks escaped destruction.

The Brea fire, also started by lightning, caused, if it spread no further a loss in the neighborhood of \$2,000,000. Three reservoirs, a small oil refinery, 70 acres of walnut and orange trees, three expansive ranch homes and several houses on the tank farm property were consumed by the flames.
