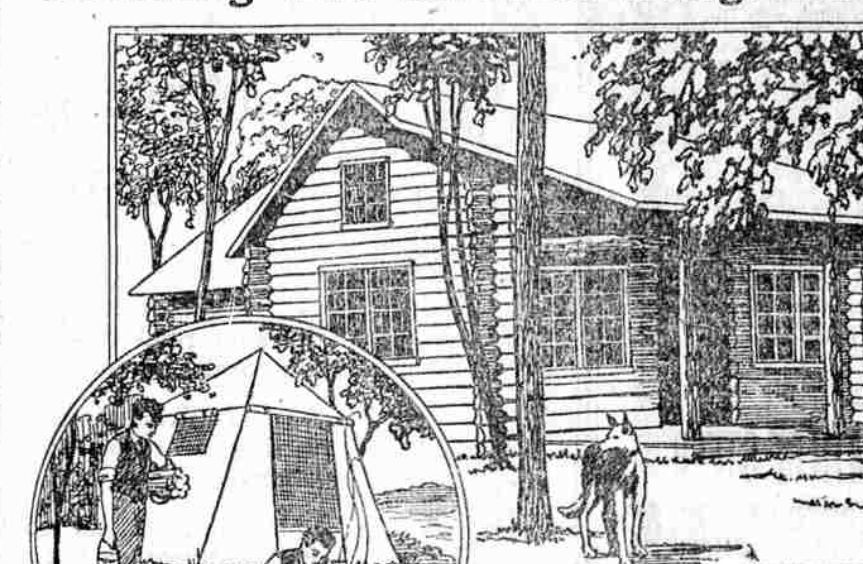

Stocking The Summer Bungalow



THE first warm days of spring carry our thoughts forward, in leaps and bounds, to the eagerly anticipated joys of summertime. Especially does the fortunate possessor of a summer bungalow, or camping place of some sort, begin to make plans for the happy weeks or months to be spent therein.

It is not too soon, even now, to spend the week-end at the "old camping ground." And it is an excellent plan to begin at once to stock up with canned foods. For many of these are being sold at greatly reduced prices and real bargains may be had by those who are on the watch.

You will find these prepared foods a life-saver when you get away from cities and towns. Even though surrounded by prosperous farmers, you may not be able to get fresh foods from them. Farmers, now-a-days, ship most of their produce to town, or sell it in bulk to the canners. In many sections of the country, the entire crops are contracted for before they are planted.

In planning to stock the shelves of your summer bungalow, you should go at the task systematically. The amount of foods to be taken will depend upon the length of time you expect to spend there, upon the probable number of people to be considered, and upon the amount of space you will have for storage. It is better to err on the side of plenty than to risk running short of provisions. It is well to bear in mind, that appetites will be sharpened by the outdoor life, and all will eat twice the usual amount. What canned foods you don't use you can bring back, since they keep indefinitely.

You should figure, for instance, that for breakfast you will want packages of various cereals, jars of marmalade, cans of coffee, and evaporated milk. For the two other meals of the day you will want a varied assortment of canned soups, tinned meats, fish and poultry, canned vegetables of all kinds, especially the staples, tomatoes, corn, peas, baked beans, spinach, stringless beans. Canned sweet potatoes and spaghetti will help to vary your menus. Of course, you must take a plentiful supply of canned fruits, for soups, salads and desserts. Their juices will make cool, refreshing drinks for hot days. Cans of tea and cocoa will be wanted, as well as the coffee.

Both brown bread and cheese now come in tins, and you will find a supply of these exceedingly valuable. Salt, pepper, paprika, onion-salt, and other seasonings will be needed.

Planning for Better Homes Week

Choosing curtains for the house brings to mind fabrics of charming color and texture hanging in graceful folds. But it is not all ways easy to get just the effect the mind first pictured, and cost must be considered. To certain the windows of even a five-room house about 40 yards of material is needed, and curtains generally have to be renewed every few years.

As a help to the local committees who under the auspices of Better Homes in America are planning and furnishing demonstration houses to be thrown open to the public during Better Homes Week, April 25 to May 1, the Bureau of Home Economics of the United States Department of Agriculture makes suggestions about curtain fabrics and ways of hanging them. Thousands of the visitors to the houses will be looking for ways of making their own homes more attractive. Curtains are an excellent means of furnishing up an old house or are needed as the finishing touch to a new one.

In planning curtains remember that windows are put in houses in order to admit light and air. Make your curtains as simple as effectiveness will permit. Elaborate curtains defeat the purpose of windows and are out of place in the average home.

Look carefully at the shape and size of the windows and how they are placed in the walls. Picture the effect of curtains of various styles on those particular windows and how they will appear from the outside as well as the inside of the house. If there are lovely views from the windows, study how to keep them without sacrificing privacy and an attractive interior. An unattractive view may need to be screened by curtains, but beware of shutting out too much light.

Study the general style of your room. Curtains can help to make a room homelike and inviting or dignified and formal, depending on the kind of material used and how it is hung.

Glass curtains made of thin material and hung on a straight rod inside the casing close to the glass screen and change the color of the light coming into the room, lend an air of privacy, and are a protection to side draperies. Glass curtains should be just long enough to escape the sill.

Side draperies give a finished appearance to the window, are useful as shades if arranged to draw, and are a good means of adding greater to the room and of modifying poor proportions. In small homes, side draperies that end on a line with the apron of the window are more suitable. If a more formal effect is desired, let them extend to the baseboard or an inch above the floor.

A valance used with or without draperies carries the eye across the top, and has the effect of decreasing the height of room and window.

Before buying curtain material get samples of the kinds that seem most suitable and see how they go with walls, woodwork, floor, and furniture by both day and artificial light. Strong light shining through certain fabrics often brings out striking effects not suspected until put to this test. Excellent curtain materials can sometimes be found among the dress goods.

Fabrics and colors that will clean well and withstand light are the best bargain in the end. Examine also for defects in the weave that may show up when the curtains are hung.

With figured wall paper, choose plain-colored curtain material. If the walls and most of the furnishings are plain the curtains may be figured, but preferably with the background the same color or slightly deeper than the walls. With cream walls, for instance, a cretione with soft tan background and figures that repeat the colors used elsewhere in the room might be suitable for living and dining rooms.

In selecting figured materials give preference to conventional designs that will stand the test of being looked at day after day. Sprawling designs make the window look shorter and broader, and stripes tend to increase the height and if used in excess give a stiff uncomfortable effect.

Measure the windows with care before buying. The material, and measure and cut the material by a third, if possible, before making up the curtains. Accuracy in cutting and neat sewing go a long way toward insuring well-hanging curtains.
