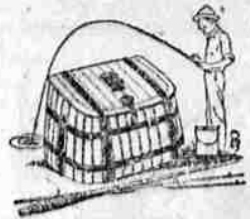

NEW INSTRUMENT MEASURES HEALING SHORT RAYS OF SUN

TUCSON, Ariz., April 12.—(A. P.)—A unique instrument—compared with others for the same purpose—has been perfected for measuring the intensity of the healing short rays of the sun by Dr. E. F. Peck of the Mt. Wilson Observatory staff of the Carnegie Institution.

The apparatus will be installed in the desert sanatorium here by Dr. D. T. MacDougal of the Carnegie Desert Laboratory.

"The instrument apparatus is capable of great precision and will prove invaluable in studying the benefits of various light waves to patients," said Dr. MacDougal. "It consists essentially of a small chamber containing a thermocouple sensitive to the short rays. The chamber is mounted on an astronomical clock which focusses a tubular lens opening directly on the sun throughout the day. A continuous graphic record is kept. The machine needs virtually no attention whereas the spectroscopic methods of measuring the rays require constant attention."

Dr. MacDougal explained that the necessary element in the instrument's construction is an extremely thin layer of silver deposited upon a sheet of quartz used as a lens. The silver coating of the right thickness permits only the short rays to pass and affect the thermocouple. A recording galvanometer attached to this puts the findings in graphic form.

"In addition to registering the constantly changing intensities of the short rays," Dr. MacDougal added, "the instrument similarly will record the green light rays, giving a basis of comparison valuable to the astronomer and which may have a significance, not yet determined, to the physiologist."

COURT SAYS QUARANTINE FOR GOVERNMENT ALONE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, April 12.—The supreme court today refused to review its recent decision prohibiting states from quarantining against plant pests.

The question reached the court through an appeal by the Oregon Washington Railroad and Navigation company seeking to have set aside a quarantine by Washington state against passage through the state, except under prescribed conditions, of alfalfa hay from states where the alfalfa weevil was a pest. The court by a divided vote held that the federal government exclusively occupied the quarantine field.

Since the decision bills have been introduced in congress to give the states the right to place quarantines.
