SPELLING CONTEST PRIZES

First Prize to Grand Prize Winner, \$50 Gold Watch
(Boys or Girls) and \$5 in gold.

Five dollars in gold will be awarded to each champion speller of the fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth grades of each of the Benson, Rose, Fullerton and Central schools at the grand contest.

Rules and Regulations, Kiwanis Spelling Contest

Each elementary school in Roseburg shall send three champion spellers from each of the fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth grades to compete for the championship of the city. The championship oral contest will be held at the high school auditorium on Friday night, April 23, at 7:30 o'clock. The selection of the three best spellers from each elementary grade above named will be left to the teachers of the various grades, who shall conduct elimination contests.

At the championship contest the champion speller of the three in each of the fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth grades of each of the four schools, the Benson, Rose, Central and Fullerton will be awarded \$5 in gold.

The grand prize winner, or champion of the entire contest, will receive a \$50 gold watch, either boys' or girls' to be selected by the winner, and \$5 in gold.

A committee of three Roseburg Rotarians will act as judges for

the spelling contest and all questions concerning the spelling of words shall be decided by these three judges.

The sources of words to be used in the championship contest will be from the Buckingham Extension of the Ayres Spelling Scale as printed in The Roseburg News-Review prior to the contest; and the present textbook, Book 2 of the New World Speller for the fifth and sixth grades and Book 3 for the seventh and eighth grades. A supplementary list will be prepared by the superintendent for use in the event the above list of words is exhausted.

When a word is given out to a contestant he shall be adjudged to have failed unless he immediately pronounces it, spells it correctly if first attempt and if necessary indicates capital. Permission is given to repeat a letter or letters once, provided no change is made. If a word is not understood by a contestant when it is first pronounced it shall be repeated, defined or used in a sentence before the contestant shall be adjudged to have failed.

PIONEERS WILL MEET AT CHAMPOEG SATURDAY, MAY 1

SALEM, April 15.—Historical Oregon gradually is coming into its own. Much of the glamour and romance of those stirring times during which the winning of the West was accomplished is intertwined with the discovery, development and growth of this state. In blazing the trail of civilization across the plains and over the great mountain ranges, the hardy pioneers who won their way to the Pacific Northwest wrote the proud record of their achievement in immortal letters upon the pages of American history.

There has been almost a complete failure to mark the historic spots in Oregon by monuments and memorials of one sort or another to appropriately commemorate the shining triumphs of pioneer days and perpetuate the proud memory of almost superhuman accomplishments over countless difficulties and well nigh insurmountable obstacles. Such memorial monuments are enhanced in interest as time passes. Thousands of persons will visit them every year, including numbers from practically every state in the Union, as well as from foreign countries. The fame of Oregon's treasure of historical value, as well as its present day beauty and resources, will in this way be annually enhanced and diffused over a wider territory with each succeeding year.

On Saturday, May 1, there will be held at Champoe, thirty miles south of Portland, ten miles west of Astoria, about seven miles north of Newberg, and about thirty-three miles north of Salem via Woodburn and St. Paul, on the east bank of the Willamette river, one of the most significant annual celebrations connected with the romantic history of Oregon. This will be in commemoration of the eightieth anniversary of the establishment and organization of the first American government on the Pacific coast, authorized by the people of the Willamette Valley at Champoe on

May 2, 1843.

Under the auspices of the Oregon Historical society there annually are conducted fitting exercises in Champoe park in commemoration of the important and inspiring incidents which transpired there. This year the occasion will be of exceptional interest and importance, and thousands of persons will attend.

The thought presents itself that Oregon should keep pace with its characteristic progress by providing not only for present needs, but for the years to come. It is a lamentable fact that our state has not built for the future in the matter of taking the necessary steps not only for the preservation of these various points of interest, but for adding the public by providing adequate information and signs along the highways leading to them.

It is certain that Oregon's growth and development in the future will outrun the most hopeful and imaginative vision of today. It is not the point of wisdom to build for the future along the lines suggested as well as in other fields of endeavor and enterprise.

Unquestionably there would be many more persons in attendance

at the memorial celebration at Champoe on Saturday, May 1, than will attend those exercises if the roads leading to that famous spot were properly marked.

To a like extent it is true that if the highways to other points of vital interest were adequately indicated the value of these places to our state greatly would be enhanced.

STRAWBERRIES PLACED ON PORTLAND MARKET

PORTLAND, April 15.—Credit for the first Oregon strawberries to reach the Portland market belongs this year to John Ausmus, of Myrtle Creek. Twenty-one boxes of berries, Early Triumphs, were received yesterday from the Ausmus farm by Bell & Co. and were retailed by Seely-Dresser. They sold at 60 cents a box, which price was willingly paid by strawberry-hungry Portlanders, who pronounced the flavor excellent.

The first Oregon berries of 1925 were received on April 25, almost two weeks later than the first arrivals this year.
