HAWLEY SUBMITS GRANT LAND BILL IN LOWER HOUSE

Congressman W. C. Hawley today introduced in the lower house of congress a bill similar to that recently introduced in the senate by Senator Stanford, proposing to reimburse 18 counties in Oregon for taxes lost because of reversion of O. and C. grant lands, according to a telegram received by J. E. McClintock, president of the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce from Gray Gordon, a member of the delegation which recently went to Washington, D.C., to represent the counties affected by the bill. Hawley's bill is practically identical with that offered by Senator Stanford, and carries provisions for the advancing by the government of approximately five million dollars in the 18 counties in which the reversioned grant lands are situated. The introduction of Mr. Hawley's bill, allowing joint consideration in both houses of congress, will hurry the final action on the measure which is of great importance to the state of Oregon. The chamber of commerce urges that all people interested in the measure who Congressmen Hawley at once commending him for his action and urging his active and energetic and continued support of the measure as being of supreme importance to the taxpayers of Oregon.
