The Roseburg team, under the coaching of Miss Jacobs, commercial instructor, has been doing excellent work and has achieved great speed and efficiency. It is believed that the Roseburg typists will be able to make a good record in the contest. The members of the team are Lucille Koenig and Marie Langenberg, seniors; Rhea Gates and Margaret Hewitt, juniors. Miss Jacobs accompanied the team as coach. The members of the party and their typewriters were conveyed to Corvallis by Miss Louise Douglas and Clifton Agee. They will return tomorrow.

MARKET RATINGS

PORTLAND, Ore., April 16.—Egg receipts are coming in the local market in the wave of heavy arrivals. Today receipts are posted a cent higher on the dairy exchange at 21 cents although other grades held steady and unchanged.

There is a keen demand both for outside shipping and for storage. Approximately a carload of eggs went into local coolers yesterday when holdings increased 424 cases to a total of 29,984 cases.

Receipts are liberal in spite of all reports to the contrary. Arrivals Wednesday were reported at 1,560 cases with 2,121 cases or more than four carloads reported yesterday. Storage operators who took a severe jolt on last year's deal are again putting eggs into the coolers at comparatively high prices, although they emphatically declared a few weeks ago that they would not store unless prices sought a more reasonable level.

Net prices at the exchange today are: Extras 25 cents; firsts 24c; mediums 23c and receipts 21c. The local butter market is displaying a firmer undertone today with all grades of cubes in demand. Prices are higher in the Puget Sound district and steady to firm in the south. California still affords a good shipping outlet. Cube receipts yesterday totaled 16,242 pounds with 22,983 pounds manufactured by local creameries.

The 15 cent advance in the local sugar market is now generally effective with best cane quoted at \$6.60 and beet at \$5.55 a sack.

Potatoes steady, \$2.75 to 4.00 sack. Onions quarter higher, \$2.00 1/2c.

Nuts sluggish; market still heavily supplied with walnuts, which are showing dealers a loss on account of the high prices that prevailed last fall. Walnuts, No. 1, 19c 1/2c; filberts nominal; almonds 30c 1/2c; Brazil nuts 29c 1/2c; Oregon chestnuts nominal; peanuts 10 1/2c.

Cashew bark nominally steady, 7c; Oregon grape root nominal.

Hops steady, 1925 crop clusters 24c 1/2c; 2 year contracts 29c.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 16.—Wheat: Bill hard white, hard white, bluestem, hard 14 1/2c; soft white, western white 14 1/2c; hard winter 14 1/2c; northern spring 14 1/2c; western red 13 1/2c.

BOSTON, April 16.—The Commercial Bulletin tomorrow will say:

"The eastern wool markets continue very quiet. Apparently there is nothing in the immediate outlook to give anyone much confidence. Business at the mills is slow and generally unsatisfactory. All along the line buying is hard to mouth and consequently competition is all the keener with narrower profits and frequently mills sell without profit to keep their organizations intact."

"In the wool buying has been slow overall and a small volume of wool has been sold. In Montana 28 cents has been paid, partly on manufacturers' account for bulk half blood clips, although most growers have been firmly asking forty cents. In other sections there has been little change, one or two choice clips in Nevada and Texas have been purchased at a half cent advance in the gross, but probably at satisfactory clean costs. Some buyers have withdrawn virtually from the market, quoting lower prices."

"The foreign markets are fairly steady on merinos and fine cross breeds while medium to low cross breeds are easier, prices being down a half a penny on tops."

"Mohair is firm with no business at moment reported."
