TWO PARTIES ONLY TO MAKE NOMINATIONS

Republican and Democratic
Parties to Participate in
Primary Election.

OFFICES ARE LISTED

Secretary of State Certifies
Places to Be Filled at
Election to Be Held
on May 21.

Only the two major political parties in Oregon, the Republican and Democratic are subject to making their nominations for the offices to be filled at the general elections through the primary election to be held Friday, May 21, 1926. This is because no other political party in this state has cast a sufficient number of votes to bring it under the provisions of the primary nominating elections law.

Under the requirements of the law, Sam A. Koser, Secretary of State, some time ago mailed to the various county clerks by registered letter, statements listing the several state and district offices for which candidates will be selected by the Republican and Democratic parties in the primary election to be held May 21. This list includes national committees to be selected by those parties for the ensuing four-year term.

It is the duty of the county clerks to prepare printed notices containing the various state, district and county offices for which there are to be made nominations in their respective counties, not less than thirty days prior to the primary, and to mail two of these notices to each judge and clerk of election in

each precinct. The notices must be posted immediately by the judges and clerks in suitable public places in their precincts.

The following is the statement of certification by the Secretary of State to the county clerks, detailing the various state and district offices for which nominations will be made by the two parties at the primaries of May 21, 1926:

National Committee—One member of the national committee of each political party within the meaning of section 3965, Oregon Laws.

To Be Nominated.
United States Senator in Congress—1.

Representatives in Congress—1st Congressional District, 2nd Congressional District, 3rd Congressional District.

Governor.

Justices of the Supreme Court—3.

Superintendent of Public Instruction.

Commissioner of the Bureau of Labor Statistics and Inspector of Factories and Workshops.

Commissioner of the Public Service Commission of Oregon (State at large).

Judges of the Circuit Court—4th Judicial District—Multnomah county, Department No. 4-1; for term expiring first Monday in January, 1933.

NOTICE OF SPECIAL CITY ELECTION

Notice is hereby given that on April 5th, 1926, the Common Council of the City of Roseburg passed Ordinance No. 884 thereby referring to the legal voters of the City of Roseburg to be voted upon at a special election to be held in said City on Friday, the 21st day of May, 1926, a proposed Ordinance in words and figures as follows, to-wit:

Ordinance No. —
An Ordinance prohibiting Opening or Conducting of any Theatre, Theatrical Show, Moving Picture Show, Vaudeville Show, Minstrel Show, Concert, Special Exhibition, Entertainment, or Amusement on the First Day of the Week, Commonly Called Sunday.

Be It Ordained by the People of the City of Roseburg:

The City of Roseburg does Ordain as follows:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for the proprietor, manager or agent of any theatre, theatrical show, concert, special exhibition, moving picture show, vaudeville show, minstrel show, entertainment or amusement to open or conduct the same within the City of Roseburg upon the first day of the week, commonly called Sunday.

Section 2. Any person, firm, company or corporation who shall violate any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined not to exceed \$200.00 and costs, and in default of the payment of such fine, to be imprisoned in the city jail one day for each \$50.00 of such fine.

That said Ordinance No. 884 further provides the form of the title in which said proposed Ordinance shall be submitted on the official ballot at said election, which form is as follows:

An Ordinance Prohibiting the Conducting of Theatres, moving picture shows, etc., on Sunday.

Vote "Yes" or "No."

501. Yes.

502. No.

Notice is hereby given that pursuant to said Ordinance there is hereby called and will be held in the City of Roseburg, Oregon, on Friday, the 21st day of May, 1926, a Special Election for the purpose of submitting said proposed Ordinance to the legal voters of said City for their approval or rejection.

The voting places in the respective voting precincts and the judges and clerks of election therein, for holding said election in said City, are the places and the judges and clerks thereof, which will be designated by the County Court of Douglas County, Oregon, as the voting places and judges and clerks thereof for holding the primary election to be held in said City on said date.

That said election will commence and close on said 21st day of May, 1926, at the time provided by the laws of the State of Oregon.
