## MANY TRIBUTES PAID TO MEMORY BINGER HERMANN

Many high tributes have been paid to the memory of Binger Hermann by men of high standing and by the press throughout the state. Words of praise of the statesman, both for his public service and for his personal attributes, have been many. A pleasing tribute was paid to the memory of the ex-congressman today by B. W. Johnson, who for many years was editor of the Corvallis Gazette. Mr. Johnson was intimately associated with Mr. Hermann in a political way during the campaign from 1894 to 1898 and they were very firm friends.

"I had known Mr. Hermann more or less intimately since boyhood," Mr. Johnson says. "Throughout his career I was impressed with his honesty and sincerity. No man ever served his state with more fidelity or effectiveness. Of the public men I have known, he possessed the most charming and interesting personality. His affection for his friends and his loyalty to them were among his outstanding characteristics. These coupled with his energy and ability made his public career of immense value to his constituency. His record entitles him to a very high place in the history of the Pacific Northwest."

Another tribute was paid by the Portland Telegram, which concludes an editorial devoted to his memory with the following words: "Binger Hermann was not a great statesman. He made no pretensions as such, but loomed so far above many of his associates at Washington, that as long as he was in Congress he commanded attention and was usually successful in securing what he wanted."

"He was one of a vanishing type of Oregonian who were the real builders of our commonwealth. His life span stretched so far beyond that of most of his compatriots that his passing will not cause the widespread interest and regret that it would have occasioned a dozen years ago, but his name will always hold a prominent place on the early records of Oregon history."

not presented. To me his life has been an actual exemplification of the Moorish legend of Abu Ben Adhem, for his name led all the rest because he loved his fellow men.

"I believe in immortality. God gives us life here, and I do not believe that he would create man and place him in this beautiful and happy world only to destroy him and send him to oblivion. The miracle of immortality is no greater than the miracles which we see about us daily; the sending of words and pictures through the air without wires, talking across the ocean. Miracles! I believe in immortality and I believe that we will meet our loved ones in that Great Beyond."

The short eulogy followed an impressive ritualistic service conducted by the officers of the Elks lodge. Interspersed with the ritual were hymns by the Elks male quartette and by Mrs. Fred L. Strang. The services were closed with a prayer by Rev. H. L. Caldwell, after which the Masonic lodge took charge and conducted the funeral rites. Both the Masons and Elks were represented by the attendance of the members of the respective orders in a body.

The beautiful reception hall of the Elks temple was filled to capacity by the many sorrowing friends of Mr. Hermann, while many who could not get inside the auditorium, stood outside on the spacious veranda where the voices of the speakers and singers could be heard.

During the hour of the funeral all business was suspended, the stores, banks and offices being closed until after 3 o'clock.

Among the hundreds who attended the impressive services were to be seen the faces of many pioneer men and women, personal friends of the late Mr. Hermann. A group of these men formed the list of honorary pallbearers, who were J. W. Hamilton, George M. Brown, A. C. Marsters, J. W. Perkins, E. L. Parrott, J. B. Horner, F. J. Blakely and Russell Dement.

The services although brief, were of an impressive and fitting nature, and were appropriately brought to a close with the recitation of the beautiful anonymous poem, "Not Understood," which concluded the governor's eulogy: Not understood. 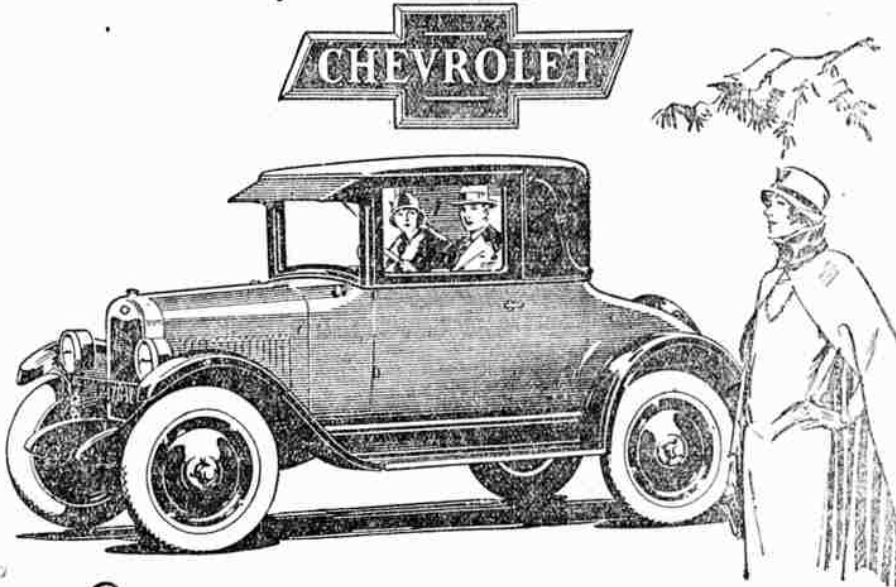
