SAVING PROGRAM
TO BE INSTITUTED

In the interests of the Red Cross Life Saving program, L. E. (Zip) Palmer, of San Francisco, first aid and life saving instructor representative for the American Red Cross, arrived in Roseburg this morning. Mr. Palmer's visit is being carried out in cooperation with the Douglas County Chapter of American Red Cross, of which Dr. B. R. Shemmer is chairman.

Arrangements have been made for Mr. Palmer to interview Mrs. M. M. Graybill, leader of the Campfire Girls, relative to the proposed participation by that organization in the Red Cross First Aid and Life Saving program.

Mr. Palmer will discuss with Mr. E. A. Britton, Boy Scout executive, similar cooperation with the Boy Scouts. Mr. Palmer is also interested in meeting any local swimmers who are anxious to qualify as Red Cross life saving examiners.

A Life Saving Institute to be held at Seaside from June 20th to 26th, is announced by Palmer. Four of these institutes are being held.

Mr. W. A. Carter is a married man with three children, having been a resident of Oregon for the past 22 years. Before moving to Portland (Multnomah county), he resided in Jackson and Marion counties. At the present time he is engaged in the law practice. In 1901 Mr. Carter was in the state legislature, and had the honor of being the "most best liked" man serving his state.
